## Burgess Says British Gov't Terrified He Will Return

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Deflected diplomat Guy Burgess claimed here the British government obtained a warrant for his arrest last week partly because it is "terrified" of his possible return to England.

Burgess, in an hour-long interview with a reporter at his Moscow apartment, also said the warrant was counter-propaganda to last week's return to Russia of defected Soviet scientist Alexei Golub.

Burgess said there is nothing to British claims that he might try to return to England.

"I like living in the Soviet Union under socialism," he said. "I wouldn't like to live in expensive London."

**TO END RUMORS**  
He said he broke a Black Sea vacation to return here voluntarily to try to clear up a swarm of reports that have appeared since the warrants were issued.

Sir Reginald Manningham-Buller, British attorney-general, announced last Wednesday that warrants for the arrest of Burgess and his fellow ex-diplomat Donald MacLean had been obtained for violation of Britain's Official Secrets Act.

Burgess and MacLean defected together 11 years ago.

MacLean has refused to answer reporters' questions since the warrants were obtained.

Burgess said he thought there were "dozens" of reasons for the British action, now, "after 10 long years."

**PANIC EASILY**  
"One is the British government is so easily flung into a panic," he said. "They are positively terrified of my going back to England."

"I have heard that from my confidential sources in England and from many friends in the establishment and even in MI-3 (Britain's security arm)."

Burgess said Golub, the Soviet biochemist who returned to Russia after gaining asylum in The Netherlands, also had something to do with the warrants.

Golub and another defector held a press conference here last Wednesday, the day the warrants were announced in London.

"Somebody decided it would be a good idea to take Golub off the front pages and put Burgess on them," he said. "It was a good idea, they thought, to counter Golub's statement that he liked the Soviet Union by making up another that Burgess didn't like it and wanted to leave."

**Magazine Inserts Now Will Go Free**

OTTAWA (CP) — Advertising inserts in magazines will no longer be subject to extra charges, the post office department said here.

Inserts composed of bound-in pages, plastic, foil, fabrics and other material similar to paper will be accepted at the usual postal rate for periodicals. The distribution to subscribers abroad formerly were considered to be samples subject to additional charges.

The statement said the change in regulations is designed to give wider leeway to magazine advertisers and to implement in part the spirit of the recommendations by the royal commission on publications.

## Job Placements Show Increase

OTTAWA (CP) — Job placements by the National Employment Service in the first three months of the year continued to exceed corresponding periods for every year since 1945, the unemployment insurance commission said here.

A total of 224,534 persons were placed in jobs in the January-March period, an increase of 24.3 per cent over 1961.

Jobs were found for 18,646 persons in the Atlantic region, 62,885 in Quebec, 81,215 in Ontario, 43,124 in the Prairies, and 19,655 in British Columbia.

## U.S. Attorney-General Sees Need To Tell Story Abroad

NEW YORK (AP) — United States Attorney-General Robert F. Kennedy has advocated the dispatch abroad of articulate Americans to preach the facts of the American way of life to all nations.

In a speech at the annual meeting of The Associated Press, the president's younger brother said that on his recent trip around the world he encountered much misinformation and misunderstanding about Americans.

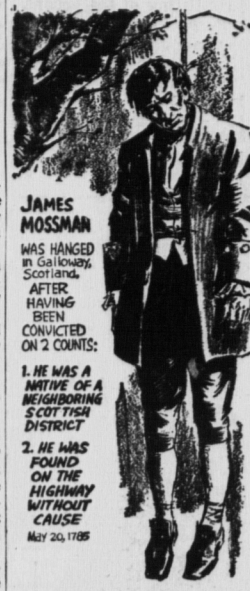
"We have a great problem," he continued, "but we have a great opportunity and, in my judgment, unless we are able in the next decade to convince the people of foreign countries—and particularly the students—that we are true to our ideals and that prosperity and decent health can be

achieved in a system that preserves individual liberty, we will lose the cold war no matter how much money we spend on aid."

"Capitalism has become a dirty word because it is synonymous with selfishness. Many people in foreign lands believe that Americans are interested only in material gains, that they are not interested in their neighbors and not interested in those that are less well off."
