THE ISLAND FISHERIES.—Herring are very plentiful from Miminigash to Kildare, and fair at Georgetown. Lobster fishing is reported good at Waterford, Tignish and Georgetown, but poor at Alberton.

PLATE GLASS.—The new plate glass pane for the London House show window, to replace the one cracked last winter, arrived a few days ago and was successfully put in yesterday afternoon. The pane is the largest in the city, and is one of the largest in the Maritime Provinces.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon a young man named William Power was given two months' imprisonment with hard labor for assaulting Robert Kelly on the 29th of August last, and for assaulting Michael McCarthy on the 10th of October last. THE DAIRYING INDUSTRY.—A copy of a very useful and instructive pamphlet dealing with the Experimental Dairy Station at New Perth and its work during the year 1892 has been handed THE EXAMINER. The pamphlet was written by John Hamilton, Esq., of New Perth, and the work has been well done. The contents include a description of the station at New Perth; milk routes and carriers; the season's work at the station; the pig colony; the cow as a wage earner; stock and shares of Perth Dairying Company, and schedule of forms. The station at New Perth was opened last year by Mr. Thomas J. Dillon, of Ontario, an experienced cheese and butter maker on the staff of the Canadian Dairy Commissioner, who is here again this season.

BAIL REFUSED.—This morning, Mr. W. S. Stewart made application in Chambers for bail for William Larier, and the judges after conferring, declined to grant the application. The application was opposed by the Attorney General.

THE RALPH PEAKE.—The Point du Chere correspondent of the St. John Sun says: The first ship of the season for Point du Chere, the R-lph B. Peake, Capt. Rendle, arrived on the 9th from Charlottetown, about two-thirds loaded with birch timber. She is to finish her cargo with deals from George McKean, St. John. She is anchored in the outer berth, drawing too much water to come further in.

AFTER THE GREAT FIRES.—The Relief and Aid society, formed in St. John after the great fire of 1877, held its annual meeting on Monday. Over sixty families or persons who were left penniless and are now old still receive some aid, over \$6,000 being paid out last year. The society still has a fund of over \$50,000.

From a partial report of the receipts and expenditures of the St. John's, Nfld., relief committee, recently submitted to the Legislature, it would appear that the amount received from the outside world, in cash and goods, was \$446,051. In cash the committee have remaining \$70,776, and in goods \$2,930. A fuller report will be submitted as soon as possible.
