LATEST NEWS SUMMARY.

BRITISH.
Mr. John Forster is engaged upon a life of Dean Swift. It will contain much matter derived from hitherto unpublished and important material.

The Duke of Edinburgh has made a substantial addition to his income by selling his right of succession to the throne of Saxo-Coburg-Gotha to the German Empire. He gets for his birthright an annuity of £20,000.

The memorial erected by the late Lady Franklin to the memory of the gallant ship plorer who died in the Northern Seas in 1847 was unveiled on Saturday in Westminster Abbey. It is placed in the chapel formerly called St. Michael's, but from the fact of the unveiling and the fact that the ship was named after her, it is called the Nightingale Chapel.

These are from the pen of the Dean of Westminster, who has taken considerable interest in the work of the day. At the ceremony were several friends of the deceased, amongst them being Miss Grace, a niece of Sir John Franklin. The bust is said to be an admirable likeness.

At the Stonehouse police-court the day before yesterday the case of the ship Seaford, which was wrecked in Plymouth Sound, was charged by Captain Dalziel, the commander of the vessel, with refusing to proceed to sea. The case was partly heard on the 11th inst., but the magistrates ordered the ship to be surveyed.

The attempted rising of negroes in Georgia seems to be more serious than at first reported. One hundred negroes were arrested, evidence against them being the discovery of incendiary letters written by them. The excitement is intense in four counties, and armed men are pursuing the disaffected, so that a light is cast upon the negroes.

A Singular Dispute.—At Baltimore a few days ago, a well known physician, treating a child for scarlet fever, had occasion to mop its throat with a camel's hair brush, which becoming detached from the handle passed into the child's stomach, causing inflammation and death. The mother of the child asserts that the doctor, in his excitement, plunged his hand into the child's mouth to recover the brush, and that the fatality, on the other hand, charges that although the brush lay on the child's tongue, whence he could easily have recovered it, the mother, by her frantic efforts to assist, made his efforts futile.

CANADIAN.
Three young children, named Lord, were burned to death in the parish of Cassimere, their mother having locked them in for safety. A telegram was received to-day from Commissioner stating that there was no longer any trouble to be feared in the North West, and that accounts had been over-estimated, as actual services had been of an insignificant character. The Commissioner adds that he had left a guard of twelve members of the Mounted Police at Fort Carleton.

A private letter from Winnipeg, dated 9th August, informs us that the grasshoppers have all disappeared, and that the weather is very warm, the thermometer ranging as high as ninety in the shade. Potatoes and barley, put in after the grasshoppers left, promise a good yield, and business generally is looking up again. The farming community, with its head-quarters at Winnipeg, is likely to prove a formidable rival in the fur trade to the Hudson's Bay Company.
