Two novel strikes are reported from Cape Town, South Africa. One is of the lawyers, who refuse to do business in court any longer under an order of the "taxing master," an official who determines the rate at which they can tax costs. The strike had not been adjusted at last accounts. The other was a strike of 600 convicts for an improved diet, which, strangely enough, was conceded, and they promised then to go to work—the next day.

The United States man-of-war "Alliance" arrived in the harbor at five o'clock yesterday evening. She is commanded by Capt. Reed, is over two thousand tons, carries two hundred men, and eight guns. She is the vessel which went in search of J. Gordon Bennett's exploring steamer "Jeanne," and reached the eightieth degree north latitude. The "Alliance" will remain here until Friday, and will afterwards visit Georgetown and Souris. She now lies off Connelly's wharves.

YARMOUTH DUCK AND YARN Co.—The work on this company's premises, on Water street, above the station grounds, is being pushed rapidly forward. The foundation for the main building is now ready, and the work of bricklaying was commenced Monday. The building is to be constructed of brick, three stories high, 100 feet front by 72 feet. The boiler house, which is to be of brick also, will be 50x54 feet, two stories high. The upper story is to be reserved for the "picker." The chimney, which is now about 20 feet high, is to be 100 feet. The buildings are expected to be covered in before cold weather. The engine and boiler are to be furnished by the Burrell-Johnson Iron Co. Mr. Oldfield, the manager, is now in Boston purchasing a part of the machinery.—*Yarmouth Herald.*

If people were to think twice, the first marching tunes would perhaps seem as ludicrous as the other. Other innovations are to follow. The Bands are to take the place of the regular choir on certain Sundays of the year. Whatever may be thought of this musical profanation of the Sabbath, it is certain that more lay soldiers were in church, and more spectators at the Garrison Chapel than it is customary to see there. The Halifax people are probably anticipating a visit of the Salvation Army performers, and are trying what use can be made of good music in the interest of church attendance, before their ears are stunned by the drums and flutes and hallelujahs of the Salvationists.

CRICKET.—On Saturday last, the Wanderers met the Garrison Cricket Club on the grounds of the latter, and defeated them by a score of 141 to 136. As the Wanderers were at the last innings, the day, no less than 65 overs being bowled to them, it looked as though the game would prove a draw. At twenty-nine minutes after six, the Garrison Club were five runs behind and had one wicket to go down; and down it went, Major May losing his stumps on the last ball of the last over that was to be bowled. The Wanderers are to be congratulated on their victory. Their tour through the Province has undoubtedly revived an interest in the game in our own city, and their last performance will have the effect of waking up the too confident officers. General Lord Alexander Russell, Admiral Sir J. E. Comber, and Prince George of Wales were among the spectators at the match.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Madagascar Difficulty.

LONDON, Aug. 14. Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice, Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs, stated this afternoon in the Commons, in reply to a question, that the Government was aware that Mr. Shaw, an English missionary in Madagascar, had been imprisoned by the French, but had received no definite news as to the charge against him. It appeared, however, that Admiral Pierre, the French commander, held him to be guilty of what the latter considered a serious offence. The Government said the Under-Secretary would communicate with France on the subject of the arrest of Mr. Shaw.

Cholera in Egypt.

LONDON, Aug. 14. The commander of the British troops in Egypt telegraphs that two soldiers died at Suez yesterday from cholera.

CAIRO, Aug. 14.

There were eleven deaths from cholera here yesterday.

The Duke of Connaught.

LONDON, Aug. 14. It is announced that the Queen has approved of the appointment of the Duke of Connaught to a divisional command in Bengal.

LAWRENCEBURG, IND., Aug. 14. Bank Examiner Hayes and a committee of depositors are still at work investigating the affairs of the City National Bank.

Foot and Mouth Disease.

LONDON, Aug. 14. A virulent foot and mouth disease has appeared at Bristol among Canadian cattle received from Liverpool.

LONDON, Aug. 14. Cases of cholera are reported from Flushing, Holland.

Great Fire in London.

LONDON, Aug. 14. A great fire occurred here this morning on Orchard wharf.

Telegraph Notes.

The Kimball House, Atlanta, Ga., was discovered on fire at five o'clock on the 11th. The guests were notified and all got out safely. The total loss is \$1,000,000; insurance \$200,000.

During a thunder storm at Lincoln, N. B., on the 11th, three boys, who had taken refuge under a tree, were killed by lightning, and several houses were struck and four persons injured.

A fire on the 11th, at Vineyard Haven, Mass., destroyed almost the entire business portion of the place, and over thirty dwellings, rendering hundreds of people homeless. The loss is estimated at \$190,000; insurance about \$65,000.

The famous four-oared shell, in which the St. John fishermen so often rowed to victory and which is at present owned by the Toronto sculler, A. Elliott, was loaned by him to the Toronto senior four, but the men smashed it by running foul of a harbor tug. It is hopelessly damaged beyond repair.

It is thought that the summary conviction and severe punishment of the dynamite prisoners at Liverpool will have the effect of ending all glycerine enterprises for some time. McDermott, of Brooklyn, is lodged in jail in Liverpool and speculation is rife as to his case. A statement that he came over to be an accessor in dynamite cases is disproved by the result. Some persons, claiming to be well informed over Government, has evidence that he was implicated, during one of his visits to Dublin, with the Phoenix Park conspirators, and notably with "number one," with whom, for a short time, the police confounded him. It is possible that McDermott proposes, by exposing himself to arrest and prosecution by the British Government, to purge himself of the aspersions cast upon him.

The New York Times London special says:—Mr. Bright addressed a large meeting during the week in favor of the measure providing that natives of India may try Europeans, and was followed by a native Indian, who spoke with eloquence. There is a cloud gathering in India which denotes growing dissatisfaction and unrest; the arrogant hostility of the English against the refined and highly educated Indians; the late arbitrary and tyrannical imprisonment of a native editor for harmless and unintentional libel, and the abrupt and unexplained refusal of redress by a higher tribunal at home, all tend to provoke dangerous feeling. The Indian pension list alone amounts to over thirty millions of dollars yearly, and the drain of taxation is already so burdensome, as to be of itself almost unbearable. The population on the other hand are intelligent and educated. English principles are growing enormously, and India is beginning to think for itself on English principles and to become conscious of its power.

Halifax Steamship Line.

Direct steam communication with the Old Country has been secured by our Island shippers in connection with the above line, as will be seen by advertisement appearing in another column. The Montreal Gazette says in connection with this new enterprise:—

"The Halifax Steam Navigation Company and the New Brunswick Steamship Company have amalgamated, and will do business under the name of the former. Their first steamer, the 'Sicily,' will sail for St. John and Halifax from London about the 18th inst. It is the intention to run four steamers, giving fortnightly trips each way between the Maritime Provinces and Great Britain."

The Halifax Chronicle also says:— "In a movement like this a good start counts for much. Let the importing public remember this, and make the beginning of the work successful, by giving the 'Sicily' a large cargo."

It is gratifying for us to be able to state that some of our leading firms have decided to cable this week, ordering their goods to be shipped by the 'Sicily,' which we are informed, leaves London on the 22nd instant. We hope their example will be followed by others in want of goods being landed here early, and that the new Line's through rates to and from all points of the Island, Great Britain and the Continent will be appreciated by shippers and largely patronized.
