

duction of his qualification, members being satisfied that that qualification was perfectly good in law; and it ought to be remembered, further, that as a former House of Assembly claimed and exercised the right of deciding (even against the law) on a question of privilege, the present House has had an equally good right, we should suppose, to settle a similar question, in conformity with the law. Their inability to expel Mr. Le Lacheur, or, indeed, any of the Liberal party, is no doubt, cause of great mortification to the Tories. Expelling Liberal members, at the commencement of a Session, has become with them so confirmed and delightful a habit, that the necessity for abandoning it must be very painful to their feelings.

DEBATE ON THE RESOLUTION TO WITHHOLD SUPPLIES.—Refusal to admit Messenger from His Excellency.—Having accidentally inserted in our last the Report of this Debate from an uncorrected copy of the same, contained in a number of the Royal Gazette, in which the conclusion of the last sentence of Mr. Rae's remarks respecting the refusal to admit His Excellency's Messenger, had been omitted through an oversight of the compositor; we have thought it due to that gentleman to give his remarks entire in our present number, as they were afterwards published in the Gazette, 27th March.

Mr. SPEAKER replied that as to precedents, it devolved on him, rather more than on any other member, to speak; and he would not seek a precedent from the British House of Commons, subsequent to 1688, when their privileges, and still more their powers, had been so fully established, that the Monarch had never ventured to interfere. But, unfortunately, this House was not in that position, but rather like the British Parliament in that stormy time, which reached from the beginning or middle of the reign of Charles the 1st, down to 1688; and, at that time, many precedents would be found equally bold, in respect to the Monarch, as that now proposed in regard to His Excellency; and, since they must go by precedent, what a British House of Commons might do with respect to the Sovereign, surely this House might in respect to a Governor.
