Rome's Ancient Colosseum Threatened

Romans are again worried about their majestic, but fragile, Colosseum.

An unusually severe winter has cracked and crumbled stone in the great amphitheatre.

When great fractures appeared in the Colosseum walls in 1954, hundreds of Romans gathered in St. Peter's Square to watch the repairs.

Inside, a series of tiers called a c o m m o d a 50,000 people, though modern judges blithely doubt the figure.

The show place was opened by Titus with a 100-day festival of games, gladiatorial combats, and struggles to the death between tame and wild beasts.

On special occasions the Colosseum floor was flooded, and sham naval battles were staged.

The Colosseum served as a bull ring, a theater for religious plays, and a storage dump for gunpowder.
