THE STATE'S SUREST BULWARK

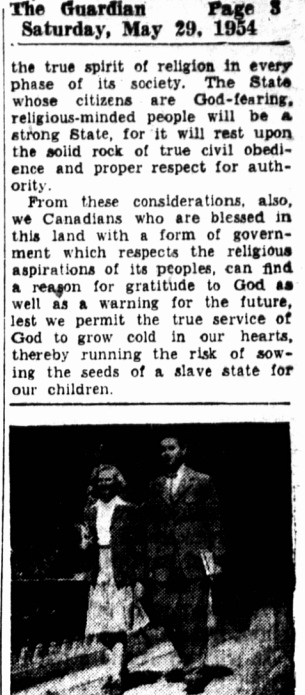
Events of the last hundred years demonstrate how much the lives of ordinary men are dependent on the civil state in which they live. Modern science has developed weapons to such a degree that it is possible for a small political minority to seize the reins of government and, by envenoming the masses, to bend them to their will. Such power in the hands of a few is so dangerous that it is most expedient that the rulers of human societies recognize their proper role in the affairs of men.

While it is natural for man to group himself into some form of society in which he seeks to work out his life on earth, nature never intended society to be man's last end. Man can never forget for an instant that he is made not for time but for eternity; not for earth but for heaven. The few years spent in this mortal frame are not as so many steps in the pilgrimage to his true home where he will enjoy the bliss of God's sight and friendship in heaven.

Hence the proper role of the State is to provide its citizens with an environment in which they can attain a way of life which, by its very nature, leads them to this final end. This way of life is nothing else but the following of Christ, as Our Lord Himself said, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life."

Such governments, instead of obtaining the respect and obedience of their citizens through motives of reverence and obedience to the God in Whose name they administer their power, will be obliged to fall back on force alone to preserve public tranquility and order. Force, however, is very feeble when the support of religion has been taken away. It is more likely to breed slavery than true obedience, and bears within itself the germs of ever-increasing troubles.

Out of all the above considerations, one thing is clear, viz., that religion in general and Christianity in particular, constitutes the best security and guarantee for the well-ordered State. Far from being a rival of the civil authority, it dwells by its side in perfect harmony, giving to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God. A good civil government can perform no greater service to itself and to its peoples than to support and foster
