THE MARKETS.—There was a fair attendance at today's market. Prices were little changed. Butter sold at 16 to 18c; eggs, 8 to 9c; strawberries, 18 to 20c; hay, 35 to 40c; oats, 42 to 45c; potatoes, 25c; mackerel (fresh) 8 to 10c; and lobsters, 2 to 3c.

THE TUBE.—The races at Summerside on Dominion Day (July 2nd), promise to be most successful. The different classes are well filled. The return fare from Charlottetown is only \$1. The special leaves Charlottetown at 8 o'clock, a. m., standard time.

FATHER McDOUGALL REMEMBERED.—Before departing for their respective homes, the members of St. Dunstan's College Band presented the Rev. A. J. McDougall with a valuable dressing case and an appropriate address to which he replied in a feeling manner.

GOLD LEAD STRUCK.—The Yarmouth Herald says—There is great excitement at Kemp, in our County. Mr. Nash has struck a 3-foot gold lead near the Cowan mine. The reported yield is beyond any previous record in that neighborhood.

BRAND MUSIC.—Yesterday afternoon, Mr. Louis G. Wheeler called upon several citizens and collected the sum of \$25 to pay the band for furnishing music in Queen Square Gardens. This sum, we understand, will go towards paying the band for playing two nights a week during the next two months, beginning (probably) on Tuesday evening next. Mr. Wheeler deserves the thanks of the community for his good work.

ST. PETER'S JUBILEE.—The first of the Jubilee services of St. Peter's Cathedral began this morning with celebrations of the Holy Eucharist at 7, 7.45 and 10 a. m. The latter service was a High Celebration, the Rev. E. T. Woodard officiating, assisted by the Rev. T. H. Hunt and the Rev. James Simpson as Deacon and Subdeacon respectively. A full choir was in attendance and the musical portions of the service were excellently rendered. Service this evening at 8 o'clock. Ven. J. A. Kaulback, Archdeacon of Nova Scotia, will preach the sermon.

THE ELLIOTT.—The S.S. Elliott sailed this morning for Boston. This steamer is advertised to sail from Charlottetown on the 10th, 20th and 30th and the 5th, 15th and 25th of every month, the delay in sailing from Charlottetown this trip was owing to the difficulty in discharging the cargo of pitch pine some of which was very large. This occasioned some little inconvenience to shippers, but will not happen again. The Elliott hereafter may be depended upon to make regular ten day trips which it is believed will give better satisfaction than irregular and uncertain weekly sailings. The next sailing from Boston therefore will be on the 5th July and from Charlottetown on the 10th of July.

THE PILGRIMAGE.—On Monday, 25th inst., about two hundred persons from P. E. Island arrived at Point du Chene to join the pilgrimage to the shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre. This number was augmented by large parties at the principal stations on the I. C. R. line, and on arriving at St. Anne de Beaupre about one thousand pilgrims formed in procession and entered the magnificent basilica. In some particular the pilgrimage was conducted in a manner that showed the greatest forethought on the part of those in charge. The journey to and from the shrine was a pleasant one, thanks to the kindness of the I. C. R. and P. E. I. R. officials. Mr. Corcoran, a young man from the offices of the I. C. R. at Montreal, particularly distinguished himself by his kind attentions. Captain McLean and Steward Chandler, of the St. Lawrence will also be kindly remembered by all. The return journey to Charlottetown was completed at 11.45 last evening.

THE POOR MONEY AGAIN.

Sir.—The Patriot wishes to reinstate itself again as the organ of the Grit party from which it has, evidently, been ousted by that new sheet called the Prince Edward Islander, which is said to be Premier Peters' pocket organ—the Arizona Kicker of the party—to be even more servile than its predecessor.

I have not seen THE DAILY EXAMINER which contained the alleged slander on Mr. H. C. McDonald, M. P. P. for Belfast in regard to the distribution of the poor money, and his certificate of character from Mr. Arthur Newbery, Assistant Provincial Secretary, is refreshing and only good so far as it goes. I have no doubt but Mr. Newbery did his duty well, and mailed the cheques on the 11th of May, last, as he says. Further, I have no doubt the "clerkmen" and at least some of the others living in the District to whom the distribution of the poor money is entrusted do their work promptly and well. It is a fact, however, that in some places there is delay. At the monthly meeting held in one of our largest Presbyterian Congregations in Belfast, on Monday, the third day of June, instant, the money was not forthcoming for distribution to poor. As I believe Mr. Newbery mailed the cheques on the 11th of May, I conclude there is gross carelessness somewhere. Mr. Hector C. McDonald disclaims having anything to do with the distribution for the years 1893 and 1894. Why did he not put in his disclaimer for the year 1892, when it is notorious that he not only had a hand in distributing it (as can be seen by the Journal of the House of Assembly for that year), but that he actually lent some of the poor people out of his money till late in August or September, and was only received by some after the most persistent dunning, made on their behalf by friends.

Now, if Mr. H. C. McDonald is not satisfied with this much publicity of the matter, the writer will undertake to furnish names, and so give the pious editor of the Patriot another chance to head an article "A Slander Refuted," which he will at the last find out to be only too true: He even will find it hard to shield the wrong doer.
