Trial For Breaking

Continued from Page 5 later saw him on Great George street. He went into a gangway by Kelly and McInnis. Mr. MacKinnon was waiting to notify the Police when the patrol came along and stopped and the policemen went into the same gangway. He later reported to the Police that there was water coming down from the ceiling of the shoe store of Agnew Surpass. He could see it in the show windows. He said he checked the entire block after seeing the accused.

Mr. Farmer maintained that the witness had not seen the accused in the gangway, but only on the sidewalk when first noticed. Sgt. Duncan MacPhail, of the City Police, testified he came on duty at midnight of December 1. He knows the accused. He saw him about 1.20 at Wimpy's Restaurant. He also saw the accused at his King street home later that night at 3.45 a.m. He was in bed and the sergeant woke him up and asked him to get dressed. His shoes were on the floor and after accused had put them on the witness took one off. It was the right shoe. He then took the accused to the Police Station.

He and Constable James Howatt, accompanied by Mr. MacKinnon had gone to Dr. Miller's office. They pushed in the door to the office because they could hear water running. They found the floor covered with it with the wash-basin overflowing and the drain plugged by a small towel. Plaster was off the wall below the wash basin. He had seen no instrument which might have been used to make the hole in the wall. This was before he had gone to the home of the accused.

He also identified the red paper produced in evidence as he had seen it on the floor of the damaged office. He had taken the shoe of the accused because of red marks he noticed on the heel. He could see them.

Heard Noise In Gangway

The reason members of the Police Patrol had stopped and gone into the gangway on Great George street was that they had heard a noise. They saw no one in there but found a wire netting partially pulled off a rear window of Pierce's Grocery store.

In Dr. Miller's office he noticed that the window in the laboratory was down but unlocked. He saw tracks on the adjoining roof near the window.

Cross examined by Mr. Farmer, he said he had seen no instrument nor flashlight and stated that it would be easier for someone

to go out the doorway and down the stairs than over the roof. It was a pitched roof with green asphalt shingles which he thought a person could walk over although he would not try it himself. He had seen no green on the shoes of the accused.

Sgt. Lund said he was in Dr. Miller's office on December 3 investigating the break there. He took samples of the paper and also some plaster. He took the paper sample with the shoes and ashes to Dr. Shaw. He had also seen the water damage in the Agnew Surpass store.

Constable Howatt said he was on duty that night with Sgt. MacPhail and they had found the ashes in back of Kelly and McInnis store on Great George street. There was a low roof back of Pierce's store and a storm door with footprints on it. A person could get over the low roof and reach Kent street through the intervening yards. He also had seen the hole in the wall at Dr. Miller's, but there was no instrument.

Police Chief Charles W. MacArthur briefly testified that he had received the exhibits from Constable Howatt and later sent them to Dr. Shaw. That concluded the evidence.

Moves For Discharge

Mr. Farmer made motion that the accused be discharged as there was no evidence before the court to connect him with any crime. He maintained the time element produced would leave the accused only 10 minutes to get from the restaurant on Queen street to the office, commit the acts complained of and then reach Grafton street.

He questioned the conclusiveness of the evidence of Dr. Shaw and said none of the evidence was conclusive as it was entirely circumstantial. He maintained that in order to convict on circumstantial evidence it was not enough to show that it pointed to the accused. It had to be consistent with no other possible solution. He did not think the Crown could ask for a conviction of the evidence presented.

Mr. Nicholson said the charge against the accused was two-fold, that of breaking and entering and doing malicious damage. He maintained there could be no doubt that somebody was in the office unlawfully that night and the accused was seen in the area. It was not circumstantial evidence on that point as eye witnesses placed him there at about the time of the commission of the act.

Opposing counsel engaged in some pointed remarks before Judge Trainor adjourned the case for judgment until 10.30 a.m. Friday, December 21.

Communication Lines In Montague Area Damaged

Telephone and telegraph communications from Montague to Charlottetown were disrupted early yesterday morning as a result of broken lines caused by high winds and fallen trees. The icy winter blast developed in the early hours with extremely high winds which blew down a large number of trees across communication lines almost isolating the area. All-

though telephone communication with Cardigan and Vernon River was still possible, that with Murray River was cut off, fallen trees having broken the line. The C.N.R. station at Montague reported almost a half-dozen breaks in the telegraph line from fallen trees in this section alone, which were reported, but further breaks along the line prevented communication with Charlottetown.

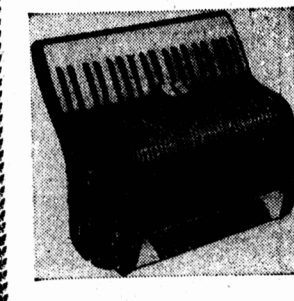
In the evening telephone calls to the city were diverted through Cardigan. The Maritime Electric lines were in continuous operation throughout the day. No damage having been suffered along this route.
