Island Odds and Ends

It is estimated that the acreage of potatoes planted in this Province will be reduced this year by about 12%, or in actual figures from 39,000 to 34,000 acres. The sagging potato market is of course the big reason, but the high cost of fertilizer is another.

A good average catch of lobsters is reported from most parts of Queens and Kings Counties especially on the north side of the Island. On the south side of Kings and Queens, particularly in the Murray Harbor district and thereabouts the catch has not been up to expectations. However, the price is good and the market is a rising one. In Prince County lobster landings have not been as good as in the rest of the Province, according to Federal Department of Fisheries officials.

Prospects of increased milk production on the Island this year are extremely bright. Provincial Department of Agriculture people say that meadows never looked better at this season of the year, and that conditions favor an excellent hay crop.

of Souris is said to be doing well. The boats are landing codfish, hake, haddock and flounders. A good proportion of the catch is made up of haddock and flounders, the fish which bring the highest money returns. The price of all four species is fair. So long as the draggers are successful at sea, the filleting plant in Souris gives employment to a large number of people.

The new show building being built at the Charlottetown Exhibition grounds is progressing to the point, where some idea of its size can be had. Quite a building with its length of more than two hundred feet and a breadth of about one hundred and fifty. A fair sized crew of workers is now employed on this construction job, which when completed will be a very useful unit in the Exhibition Association's steadily improving plant.

The Maritime Electric Company expects to build one hundred miles of lines this year under the Provincial Government's rural Electrification program. This means that the company will employ more than the usual number of men during the summer season.

Charlottetown horse-racing lovers will probably see their first meet of the season on June 26th. The local summer racing program may be cut down somewhat this year but the great annual Provincial Fair is planned to be bigger and better than ever, with racing giving its usual prominence.

Recruiting tradesmen and laborers for work in Labrador, so far as this Province is concerned has definitely ended. But Islanders who have already been to Labrador will be recalled by the company when needed. From the long list of men employed by the contractors during the last three years, names are picked from time to time and transportation is forwarded to the selected men, from Moncton. The men travel to Moncton by train, and thence by air to Goose Bay.

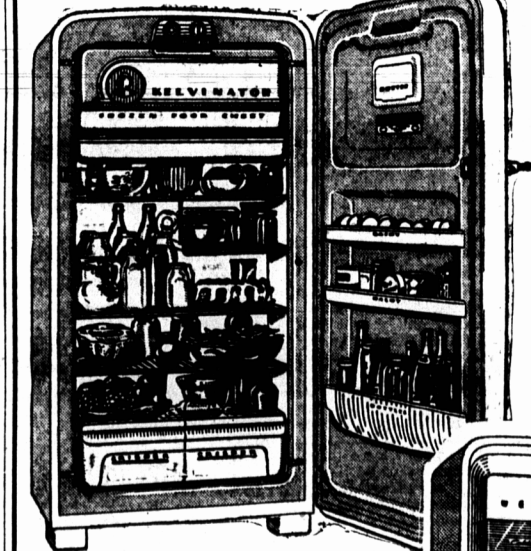

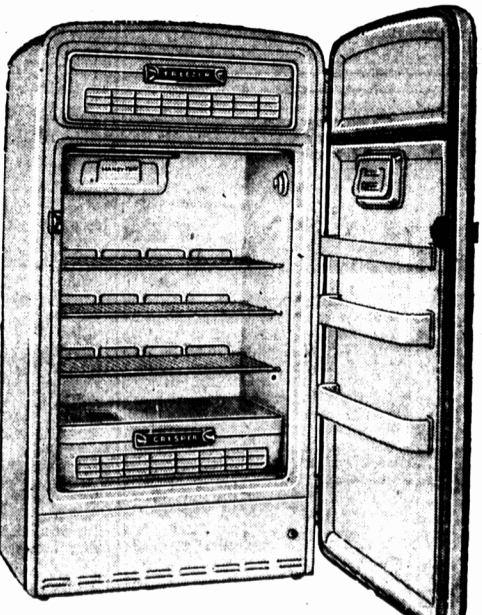

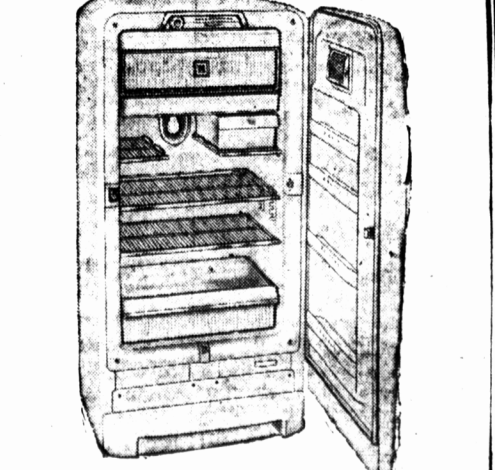
