# Quick Election Campaign Is Seen In Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Newfoundlanders will vote for a new provincial legislature Aug. 20.

Lieutenant-Governor Campbell Macpherson dissolved the House Tuesday as Premier Smallwood prepared for a quick election campaign. The main issue in his battle for special financial aid from Ottawa.

The Liberal premier confirmed earlier in the day that the election would be held Aug. 20. Nomination day would be Aug. 18. Newfoundland law requires at least 21 days between election proclamation and voting day.

Mr. Smallwood said he called the hurried election to carry a dispute with Prime Minister Diefenbaker's federal Conservative administration to the people. The premier announced his intention in the legislature Monday night after failing to receive unanimous approval for a resolution condemning the federal government's handling of Term 20 in the Newfoundland Confederation agreement.

The two-man Progressive Conservative Opposition—Leader Malcolm Hollett and member Rex Bonnet—voted against the resolution. It was carried by 20 Liberals and two members of the new Newfoundland Party, who took office March 31, 1958. The preamble of the act says Newfoundland's financial position will be reviewed at that time.

The premier's resolution said in effect the grant should be perpetual.

The two opposition members argued that the preamble guarantees that Newfoundland's case will be reviewed.

All most every Liberal and the Newfoundland party members said Newfoundland was "betrayed" by the federal government. Most charged that the constitution had been "torn up."

The debate started July 21, one day after Premier Smallwood called the House together in emergency session to discuss the issue.

The legislature first opened in February. All important business was cleared up by July 6, when the House recessed to await the federal government's decision on Term 20.

Ottawa announced its intention July 13, "an unlucky day for us," according to Mr. Smallwood.

The speech from the throne ending the session referred to the violent strike in the Newfoundland pulp and paper industry that marked the late winter and spring.

Legislation passed during the session included a bill decertifying two locals of the striking International Woodworkers of America (I.W.O.A.). The bill stirred controversy in labor circles across the country. The House passed it unanimously.

"As a result," the speech said, "the unsettled conditions which existed in the largest and most vital of our industries were remedied."

Other legislation cleared the way for development of iron ore bodies in the Carol Lake area of Labrador. Companies involved include Canadian Javelin Ltd., and Wabush Iron Company Ltd.

Another act allowed for construction of the first phase of a new memorial university here. Initial cost, to be paid over a period of 20 years, would be \$25,000,000.
