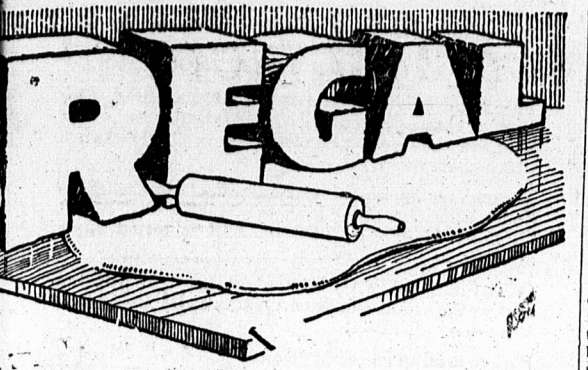

Birkenhead reports states and Canadian cattle from 21 1/2 to 22 1/2c and odd sales at 23 1/2. Steady to firmer Irish 24 1/2, prices in sink.  
Glasgow quotes Canadian and states cattle from 13 1/2 to 14 1/2c live weight per lb., bulls 9 to 10c. Prime Scotch 14 1/2 to 19c, latter for medium weights. Prospects good.  
London quotes Canadian and American ox sides dressed at 19 1/2 to 21 1/2c per lb. Reports 2,205 Canadian and American cattle at Birkenhead.  
Salinas from Montreal week June 12th carried 606 head.  
British bacon market—Canadian leanest 130s to 140s, lean 128s to 140s; prime, 125s to 135s, quiet. Danish 150s to 154s; Irish, 160s to 167s, American 97s to 104s, slow. Danish killings 37,174.

This low consumption is, of course, largely due to the light weight of the complete car, which scales little more than a ton. To sum up, we are bound to say that the new Studebaker is a car of remarkable all-round achievement."
