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SOLDIERS OF THE QUEEN

The wet and disagreeable weather last evening kept many of our people within doors, consequently there was not so large an audience at the Opera House as was expected. RAILWAY PROPOSAL

OF THE C. P. R.

Mr. Shaughnessy, of the C. P. R. has made Mr. Blair, of the I. C. R. an offer. He offers all the export business it can control to the Intercolonial. The St. John Sun remarks that this traffic, gathered in at all points on the transcontinental line, will be handed to the Intercolonial at Montreal, giving the government road the long haul which Mr. Blair values so highly. The freight rates to St. John will be the same as those charged last year by the Canadian Pacific, and the same as those claimed by rival lines to the seaboard. The Canadian Pacific agrees to drop altogether out of the competition for winter export and import traffic east of Montreal, giving the Intercolonial the monopoly of this trade of Canadian ports. If then the Intercolonial can compete between Montreal and St. John or Halifax with the Canadian Pacific, it can well do business under the proposed arrangement. In return the Canadian Pacific asks that the Intercolonial should deliver to it at Montreal such import traffic as is brought from Halifax and St. John. Here too the Intercolonial would get the long haul which Mr. Blair considered so important. The terms which Mr. Shaughnessy proposes are the same as those now in force between the Grand Trunk and the Intercolonial. The basis of division of freight receipts is the same as that which Mr. Blair has accepted from the Grand Trunk. Export and import freight rates are made on the same basis. The chief difference is that Mr. Blair has agreed to give the Grand Trunk all the domestic traffic which he can control. The Canadian Pacific does not seem to have asked for that.

The proposal is discussed by the Sun, which remarks that it is in agreement in its general effects with the arrangement that has been made with the Grand Trunk. The contract with the Grand Trunk gives the Intercolonial practically no winter business, and offers no traffic to the Canadian Winter Port. The Grand Trunk has its own winter port. Its ocean terminus is in the United States, and all the export and import traffic is handled at Portland. Therefore the Grand Trunk can do very little to build up Canadian ports, or to assist the Intercolonial to handle transatlantic business. On the other hand the Canadian Pacific, with much more important western connections, offers to run over all its foreign traffic to the Intercolonial and Canadian ports. Mr. Shaughnessy offers what the Grand Trunk could not give, its whole transatlantic traffic to the Canadian ports and the all Canadian railway. He also offers, what the Grand Trunk is not able to give, the use of a well equipped railway terminus, with wharves and elevators, all on Canadian soil, and all for a merely nominal consideration. If it should happen that the Intercolonial terminus is not sufficient for the trade, the Sand Point wharves, warehouses and elevators are at the service of Mr. Blair. The city of St. John has also large interests at Sand Point, but the city would be only too glad to join in Mr. Shaughnessy's invitation.
