I'VE TRIED to make a social life for us but he always complains about the people - somebody's husband or wife - or something. But maybe you think I've nothing to fret about.

He has nothing to be ashamed about my appearance or actions. Any time we are out, people compliment me. My housekeeping and our children receive praise also. Maybe you could help me. Thank you. P. R.

Dear P. R.: I am not clear what the problem is; and I don't think you are either. You seem to be saying that you lead a lonely life due to being shut away from your husband's interests for the most part - whatever (or whoever) they are.

However, the fact that you have seven children at your fairly youthful age, could explain why you've had difficulty keeping up with your husband's professional pace. Too, the existence of those children should keep you so busy that you seldom if ever find time hanging heavy.

It may be that your pre-occupations about your situation have their origins in your own personal history of social inadequacy. Maybe you tend to lean
