CLOSING IN UPON THE FREE STATERS.

Decisive Results Expected in a Few Days.

CANADIANS IN THE FIGHT AT HONING SPRUIT.

Botha's Masterly Retreat—Dewet's Men Deserting.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, June 26.—Lord Roberts' six columns are converging apparently so as to close in upon the Free Staters, although decisive results cannot be expected for several days.

A number of Boers, who were supposed to be within the wide-flung net, have broken, or rather stolen through Ruddle's Ficksburg-Senekal line.

The Canadians were engaged in the Honing Spruit fight last Friday. Dewet's men first cut off a Canadian outpost of Mounted Rifles at dawn, two being killed, Lieut Ingles and four others wounded, and three captured.

The Free Staters then attacked the camp where fifty Canadians and two companies of Shropshire were, though, without much effect, as the men were well entrenched.

The foreign military attaches who were with Lord Roberts are now in Cape Town en route to Europe.

Eighty Hollanders have been lodged in jail at Standerton for destroying property prior to the British occupation. The wives and children of the Boers are surprised that the British do not loot but pay for what they get.

A party of Brabant's Horse near Ficksburg saw a camp of khaki-clad men and walked in, only to find themselves among

the Boer victors. The party surrendered.

LONDON, June 26.—Further particulars of the fighting at Pennear's Fort, to the north-east of Pretoria, are forwarded by the Leader correspondent. The object of the British operations was to drive General Botha from the position he had taken up. The fighting was continuous for two days, and it was hoped that Generals French and Hamilton would be able to entrap the Burgers.

On the following day, however, it was discovered that Botha had, during the night effected another masterly retreat. The Times correspondent at Kroonstadt says: Dewet is showing capable generalship, but is unable to prevent his men from deserting daily."

ST. PETER'S SCHOOLS

Distribution of the Prizes

A number of parents and others who are interested in St. Peter's Schools were in attendance yesterday when the prizes were awarded and distributed. The Rev. Leo Williams, Rector of St. Paul's, presided and presented the prizes to the successful girls and boys. ADMIRAL SEYMOUR REPORTED CAPTURED

The Combined Forces Enter Tien Tsin

CHINESE MINISTER ASKS FOR AN ARMISTICE

Eight Thousand of the Allied Troops
Land at Taku.

CHEFOO, June 25.—Rear-Admiral Kempff reports, by Japanese torpedo boat, that the combined forces entered Tien Tsin, June 23rd, sustaining small losses.

They started on Sunday to relieve the force which left Tien Tsin, June 10, and which is believed to be surrounded near Peking.

According to Japanese reports Admiral Seymour has been captured and the Ministers have left Peking guarded by Chinese soldiers. Their whereabouts are unknown.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The Chinese Minister has asked an armistice in the sending of American troops to China, based on the assurance of the Chinese viceroys that they can maintain order.

President McKinley, while acknowledging his gratification at these assurances, made known to the Chinese Ministers that the United States cannot relax its efforts to get troops to points where its officials are considered in danger.

LONDON, June 26.—The following despatch has just been received:

"TIENTSIN, June 24.—Eight thousand of the allied troops have landed at Taku, including 1,200 Germans.

"A French officer, who has succeeded in getting through from Tien Tsin, says

that the Russian alone have lost 150 killed and 300 wounded.

"The German gunboat, Itis, up Pei Ho river, reports that masses of the Chinese are nearing Tong Hu, and that an immediate attack is expected."

OUR STREETS.

SIR,—I was amused on reading the report of the last meeting of the City Council at which they voted \$1000 of the people's money for an exhibition to be held this fall, and \$50 for a prize. They then considered the dust nuisance and not one of them had a suggestion to offer as to how it might be remedied,—so they instructed Mr. Nicholson to do the best he could in the matter. Now, Sir, I think if our City Council have money to throw away on exhibition grants which will do good to only the hotel keepers and shareholders in the Exhibition Association it would have suited them much better to have voted that \$1000.00 for some modern street cleaning appliances by the use of which Mr. Nicholson would be in a position to do something with the dust nuisance and get our streets (which have never been in such a disgraceful condition) into good repair. For instance, let them purchase a good scraper and sweeper and first clean the streets, then, instead of having the water cart go up and down Queen Street fifty times a day trying in vain to lay the 3 or 4 inches of dust on it, one or two good sprinklings would suffice. At present we see a crowd of men with shovels and brooms scraping the streets and by the time they get to the end of a street the first part is as bad as ever,—whereas with an up-to-date scraper one man and a horse would finish a street in a few hours. This may be economy, but I doubt it; and in my opinion, economy is a poor thing to practise where the comfort of a city is concerned. I have never yet seen people object to pay for good work. Our retiring City Council left a surplus of \$10,000. To what better use could it be put than the purchase of a few modern road-making machines, or if they do not wish to use that let them issue debentures for about \$5,000 and get a good scraper, sweeper and steam roller, when we would soon have streets that would be a credit to the city and a comfort to the users of them without considering the favorable impression that would be made on the tourists and visitors that will be here this summer to the exhibition.
