Marine & Fisheries

The following report of the Marine and Fisheries Committee was submitted by chairman Ken Calbeck:

"During the past season your committee has been very active in regards to securing a new pier for Summerside. A recommendation was past by this Board outlining why we required a new pier, and this was forwarded to the Dominion Minister of Public Works, Mr. J. W. MacNeill, and the Minister of Fisheries, Premier J. Walter Jones and others.

"This was supported by the Federation of Agriculture who, as primary producers, were aware of the dire need of improved facilities to handle their produce. The Summerside Journal published an editorial which outlined the benefits to the Producer and Business Men of Prince County. Your Committee sent a copy of this paper with an enclosed letter to members of the Dominion Cabinet asking their support which was acknowledged.

"Late last spring the Dominion Cabinet voted over a million dollars for this project and we are pleased to report that the necessary steel has been ordered and work can commence early next spring. Mr. MacNaught has been very active in this connection and has secured a grant for the extension of Holman's Wharf for the use of Fishermen and work on the project will also commence next spring.

"A report was sent to the Department Engineers asking that a survey be made of Summerside Harbor to find out the extent the drifting sands were effecting the Harbor. It was the opinion of your Committee that a Breakwater should be erected from the opposite side of the present one starting at the Miscouche Shoals and extending beyond the present one so as to stop the sweep of a westerly gale like the one we experienced last fall when considerable damage was done to the present old wharf. Expert advice would have to be had on a project of this nature.

"We would suggest that the incoming Committee follow this up and see what can be done. There was an increase in shipping this past season due to the heavy shipment of pulpwood; but there was a decrease in the movement of potatoes due to a smaller acreage being planted and the earlier freezeup this fall. There was one cargo assembled that had to be reshipped to St. John after the Harbor closed in. This cargo contained over 150 cartons which had to be loaded in four days and, but for the fine co-operation of all G. N. R. employees this would not have been possible.

"We wish to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Board for their co-operation during the past season."

to empty into the Bay of Fundy. It is 450 miles long, has a watershed of 26,000 square miles and is the second largest stream on the Atlantic seaboard.

In Preliminary Stages

Col. H. J. Woodbury, Boston U. S. chairman of the joint board made it clear that the project was still in its preliminary stages. The New England division engineer of the U. S. Corps of Engineers, he said the project has yet to be completed and approved by the international joint commission.

He said the study group was formed 15 months ago to study the possibility of building several hydro-electric projects on the river. Three previous meetings were held two in Maine and one in Fredericton, N. B.

However, he added the board was studying more concrete reports at this stage and it was hoped that definite conclusions could be reached within 1-2 years.

The Rankin Rapids, project the site of which is just above the rapids, would take three years before completion and an additional year to fill up the reservoir.

Would Double Output

By 1960, if the project is completed on both sides of the Border, engineers estimated that the St. John River would yield double its present hydro-electric power production.

Col. Woodbury said soundings on foundations at Cross Rocks and Golden Rapids were made previously but proved disappointing. Where rock existed on the right bank, it lacked on the left side of the river.

Last March, drillings were made at the proposed site and the reports proved satisfactory.

From sketches displayed by engineers during the discussions, the dam would be 5,900 feet long, 1,200 feet wide at the top 40 feet wide at the river bed and 200 feet high.

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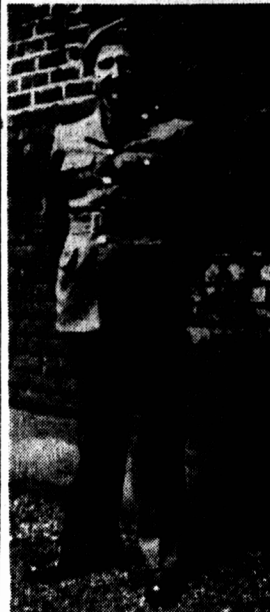
