### TURNED OVER TO U. S.

BUFFALO, June 20.—Marion Paul McQuade, 21, and Gladys Warren, 20, of Nashville, Tenn., were turned over to the police to-night by Canadian detectives who arrested the couple on Wednesday on a lonely island, 200 miles north of Toronto.

McQuade is charged with embezzlement of \$2,500 from the First and Fourth National Banks of Nashville, by which he was employed as collection teller.

The girl said that she and McQuade left Nashville on May 13. They tried to get married in Louisville, Chicago, New Albany, Ind., Detroit and Toronto, but the girl's extremely youthful appearance caused officials to refuse to perform the ceremony, she said.

Finally, their money gone, they set up a tent on the uninhabited island and were living on fish and wild berries when the detectives arrived. They were trailed through a telegram which the girl sent from Toronto to a friend in Nashville, asking for money.

ing "forward steps" taken and to grasp their share of the four million dollars, entrusted the Bell government with the control of public affairs.

That was three years ago. And now what about those four million dollars? Surely the question is a pertinent one. It would mean much to 88,000 people to come into a legacy of \$45 to \$50 each and all just now. Two hundred dollars per family would come in handy to pay taxes and store bills. Alas, that neither the millions nor the thousands nor the hundreds are in sight. The money has not been paid to us. Nor has it been awarded to us. Worse still, so far as public knowledge goes our claims at Ottawa have not been at all presented or pressed. This would seem incredible, if we are to retain any faith in governments or public men. But so it is.

After three years, nothing done, nothing doing, nothing even attempted! So far as anything the Bell government has done toward recovering our claims at Ottawa is concerned its members might as well have been asleep for three years past. A barefoot boy sitting on the wharf and fishing for tommy cods with a bent pin for a hook would have accomplished more in ten minutes if he caught a single fish. And our claim—for school lands, valued by Mr. Bell, at over four million dollars, is fading off untouched, untasted into the dim distance, just as are all the hopes that were raised by the Bell aggregation three years ago.
