Industrial Production Is Higher

OTTAWA (CP)—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics' index of industrial production, based on 1940 output equalling 100, rose nine-tenths of a point to 235.4 in October from 234.5 in September.

The gain put the index more than seven per cent higher than a year earlier and showed a

gain of about five per cent in the first 10 months of 1965. Between September and October, 1965, there was a gain of nearly 1 1/2 per cent in manufacturing output, but a drop of more than six per cent in mining. Electric power and gas utility output rose three per cent.

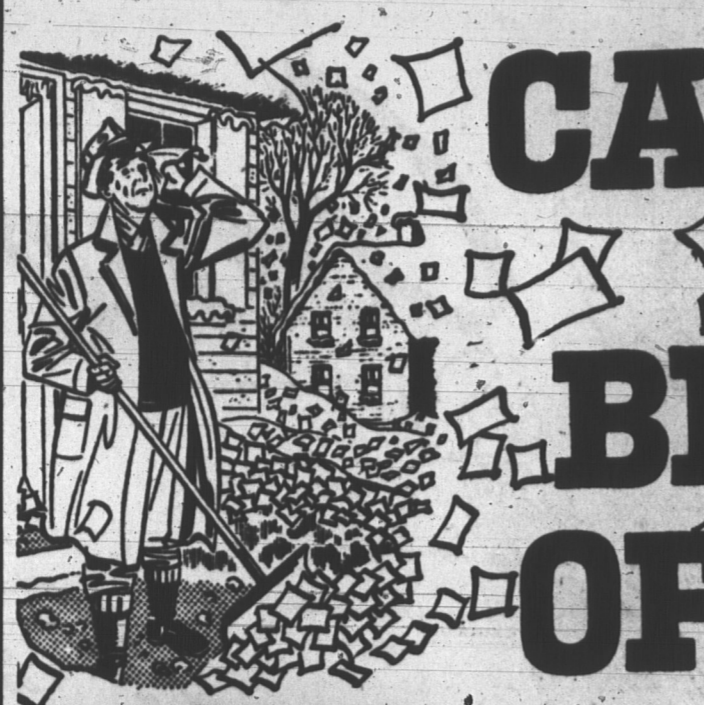
The bureau also reported that its index of real domestic product, measuring non-agricultural output with price fluctuations discounted, was 211.3 during the third quarter of 1965 on the same 1940 base. This was an increase of 1.8 per cent from the second quarter index. Most

major industry divisions contributed to the gain.

Born On Monday, Not On Saturday

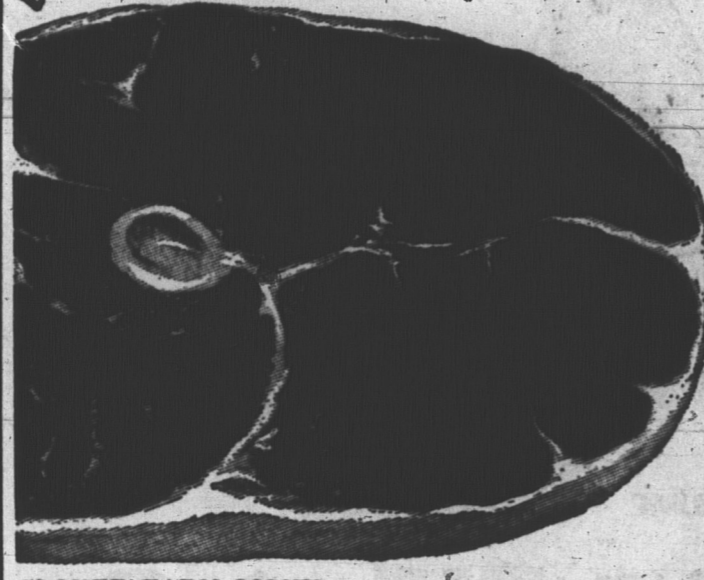
