OTTAWA, (CP)—A bill providing for appointment of an associate defence minister and 86 other measures received royal assent in the Senate Wednesday making way for Solicitor-General Campbell to fill the new cabinet post.

OTTAWA, (CP)—External Affairs Minister Pearson advised the Western powers Wednesday they should not yield to temptations to hit aggressors in new places and with new weapons because they might get hit right back in new places—such as Hong Kong—and with new weapons.

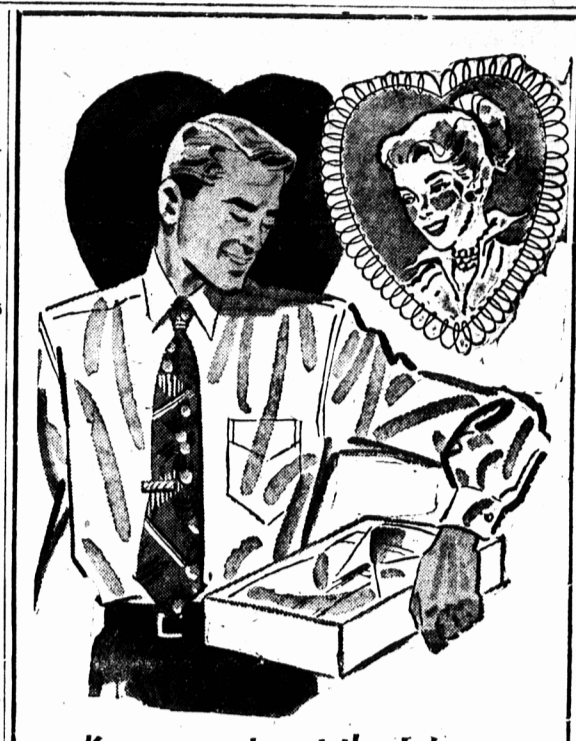
