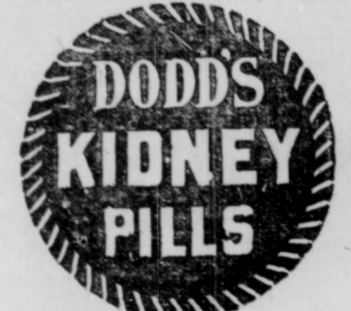

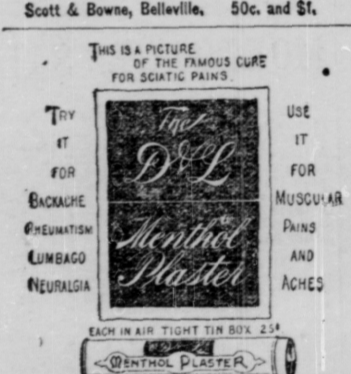

ODD HAPPENINGS.

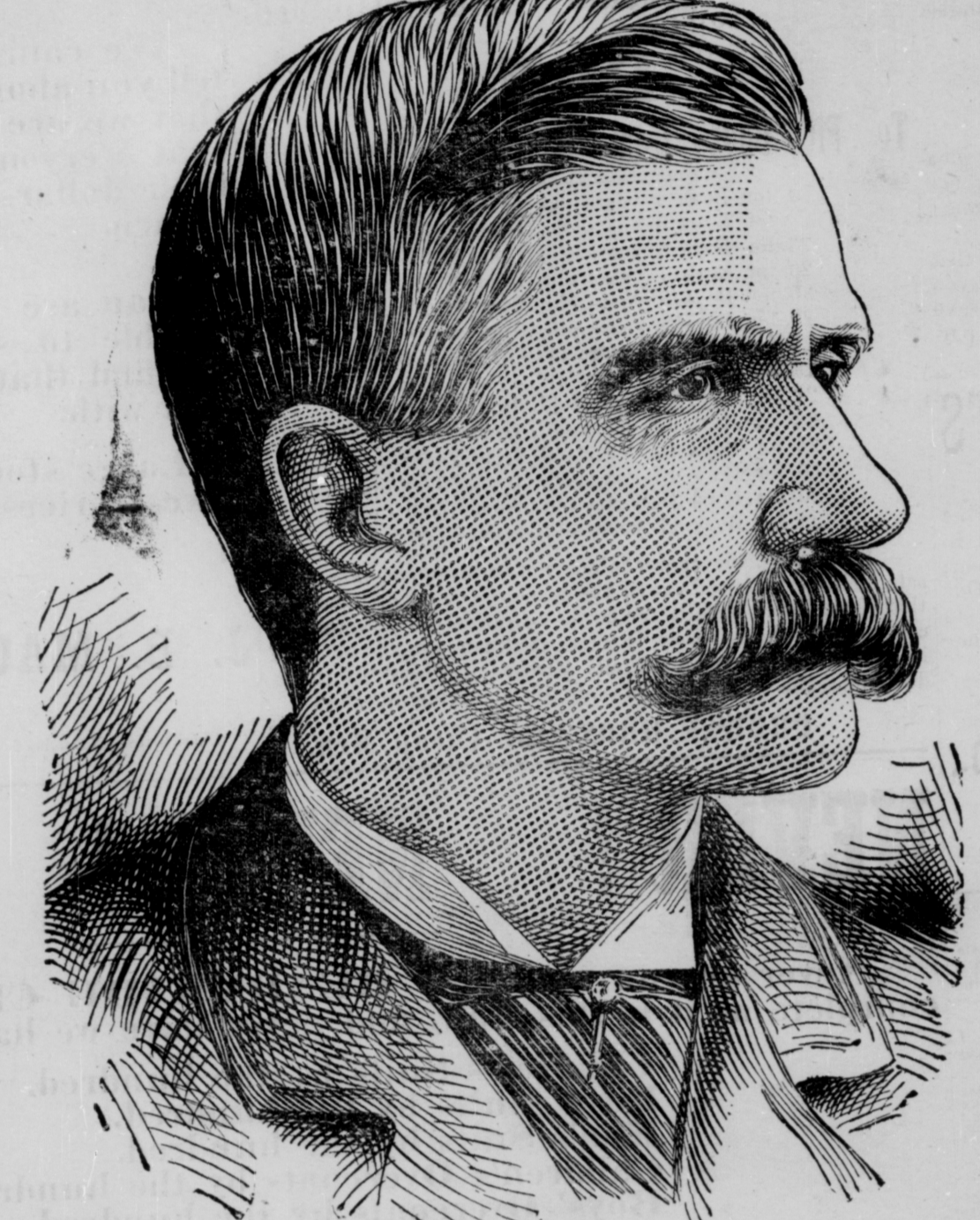
A Record of Queer Things and Rare Events Chronicled in the Newspapers. A machine blacks boots. Japan has 400 newspapers. The tomato sausage is new. Chicago has 25 foreign lawyers. There is a self-propelling bicycle. London has 320,000 maid servants. Electrical coal cutting is successful. Paris is to have moving sidewalks. London has a 200-foot Ferris wheel. Artificial human milk is announced. The Bank of England is 200 years old.

Portugal's Queen is studying medicine. Massachusetts boasts a 25-pound lobster. New South Wales has 17,207 gold mines. The Bank of England has 1500 employees. Suez Canal annual profits are \$13,300,000. In India and Persia sheep are used as beasts of burden. The Eskimos give the doctor his fee as soon as he has cured them. Prince Bismarck derives an annual income of \$75,000 from various industries in which he is interested. In Paris the demand for small dogs is met by rearing pups on an alcoholic diet, which retards their growth. Building ground comes high in London. Lately a plot of 37 square yards in Lombard street sold at \$500 per square yard. It is estimated that the commerce of the great lakes this year will exceed \$5,000,000 tons, of a value of over \$40,000,000. A company producing only one form or one part of a bicycle, the jointless rim, covers two acres of ground with its works at Birmingham, England. Cashmere shawls are much cheaper than some years back, but there are many worn by ladies of rank and fashion. The rates of transmission on Atlantic cables is 18 words of five letters, each per minute. With the "duplex" the rate of transmission is nearly doubled. In Paris, at the foot of all steep inclines, are found members of the "Wheelpushers' Guild, who for a small consideration push the rider's machine to the summit. Statisticians aver that bicycling has become a popular pastime, the last year, in consequence, has increased probably \$5,000,000 within the last 18 months. English contemporaries give currency to the report that at the present time between 30,000 and 40,000 acres of arable and pasture land are going begging for tenants in Kent. Japan has ordered 800 miles of submarine cable from England, which is to be used in a line to Formosa. The Japanese propose to do all the work themselves with their own cable ships. Mexico produces anything that can be raised in any other country. So varied is the climate that in the same state can be raised any product of the tropics and of the polar regions. It is reported that the Morning Star mining property, near Buffalo City, Mo., from which the "Big Jumbo," a solid piece of ore weighing 12,000 pounds, was taken to the World's Fair, has been sold to an eastern syndicate for \$250,000. Ten years ago the logs in Wisconsin ran four or five to a cord, and cost \$10. Now 12, 15 and even 20 logs are more required to furnish as much. In five years the decrease in diameter of the pine trees cut for lumber has been 25 per cent. A Los Angeles brickmaker has invented an oil burner for bricks that is the first of the kind to regulate the heat satisfactorily. He says that it costs \$1.75 to \$2 to burn 1000 bricks with wood, while it costs only 90 cents with the oil burner. The Irrigation Congress at Albuquerque scored a good point for the cause by calling attention to the fact that in Massachusetts about 80 per cent. of the people are landless tenants, while in irrigated Utah 90 per cent. of the families are landed proprietors. The output of alumina has increased from 225,000 tons in 1881 to 550,000 tons in 1895. The cost of production has been decreased from nearly \$10 per pound to less than 60 cents per pound. The output for 1894 was valued at \$12,250,000. Hardware. The net profits of the Bank of Japan for the past half year were \$6,916,353, of which \$300,000 and \$150,000 are to be distributed as ordinary and special dividends at the rate of 6 and 9 per cent. per annum respectively, and \$5,000,000 is to be paid as a special dividend. A saloonkeeper in the little town of George, Ia., has created some comment by issuing a circular letter in which he requests all mothers, wives and sweethearts of the village to send him the names of men who are confirmed drinkers. To all such men he agrees not to sell liquor. The largest black diamond ever seen was shown the other day to the Academy of Sciences in Paris. It was found last July in a diamond field of Bahia, Brazil. It weighed 2072 carats, the largest carbon of the kind heretofore known weighing 1700 carats; it is as big as a large pear, and without a flaw. Paris is said to be the cleanest city in the world. Every morning 2000 male and 600 female scavengers, divided into 149 brigades, turn out to perform the toilet of the capital. The men work from 4 in the morning to 4 in the evening, less two hours off for meals, or ten hours a day. The women are engaged in the morning only. San Francisco declares that it will soon have the largest store in the world. A big department store to be called the Emporium is now being built there which will cover 600 feet more space than the noted Bon Marche in Paris. It is to contain, besides the multitudinous departments found in a store of this size, a canteen, a cycling school, a barber shop, a bank and a candy factory. One of the curiosities of the cable code method of sending information is shown in a recent message announcing the loss by fire of a ship at sea. The whole message was conveyed in three words of Scott's cable code: "Smouldered, burnt, hallelujah." "Smouldered" stands for "the ship has been destroyed by fire," "hallelujah" for "crew saved by boats" and "hallelujah" for "all hands saved—informed wives and sweethearts."

It is announced that the Hamburg-American line on the voyage from New York will call at Plymouth instead of Southampton, which will mean a saving of twelve hours. Plymouth has a magnificent harbor, and has put forth claims for consideration as the English terminus of the Canadian fast Atlantic service; but it is too far away both from London and the north of England to be a convenient centre for either passengers or freight.

In the annual report of Major-General Miles, commanding the United States army, attention is called to the inadequacy of coast protection.
