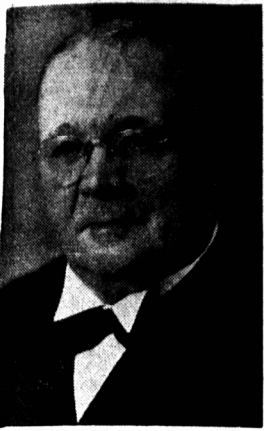


SPEAKS OVER CJRW TONIGHT

12-Months For Possession of Stolen Goods

In Judge's Criminal Court, County of Prince, in Summerside, before Judge J. S. DesRoches, Edmund J. Perry of Tignish was sentenced to 12 months in Prince County jail yesterday after being found guilty of having possession of stolen goods.

The charge read as follows: Edmund J. Perry did on or about the 10th day of August 1954, unlawfully receive and have in his possession 5 boat propellers and a water pump of a value exceeding \$25.00, the property of Myrick-MacIntosh Co. Ltd. the said Edmund J. Perry well knowing the same to be stolen.

In the second case on the docket Joseph Cyril DesRoches of Miscouche was charged with having received from Henry J. Gallant the sum of \$50.00 on terms requiring him to pay the same over to John K. Curran, did unlawfully and fraudulently convert the same to his own use and thereby steal said sum of \$50.00 The property of John K. Curran.

The charge arose from the sale, by the accused, of four calves belonging to Mr. Curran, last February, for which he received a cheque of \$50.00 from Henry J. Gallant, cattle buyer of Wellington. At the time of the transaction DesRoches was employed as head farmer at Mr. Curran's St. Eleanor farm. Contradictory evidence was heard as to whether Mr. DesRoches was ever given authority to sell the cattle. The records of buyer, Henry Gallant, showed he had made five different purchases of cows and calves from the Curran farm since October, 1953.

Witnesses appearing for the crown were J. K. Curran, Henry J. Gallant, and Joseph Earl DesRoches, brother of the accused, who was also employed on the Curran farm at the time the sale was made.

Mr. D. O. Stewart, Q.C., represented the crown, Mr. H. F. MacPhee, Q.C. of Charlottetown, acted for the accused. The case was adjourned for judgment until Tuesday, December 7th.

Prince Edward Island, Messrs. J. Watson MacNaught, Thomas Kickham and Neil Matheson, he said of Mr. MacNaught, "I am sure everyone in this county has seen the very material results of the representation of J. Watson MacNaught at Ottawa. He has diligently pursued those causes which are bound to bring results."

"Mr. Tom Kickham of Kings is representing that county with distinction. His achievements are substantial. One to which I refer is the construction of the magnificent building which was opened so recently."

Noting that both he and Mr. Neil Matheson, M.P. for Queens County were graduates of Mount Allison University, he said that Mr. Matheson in those days had been an outstanding figure on the campus where he was a tower of strength and a great source of guidance and direction. "He has brought to Ottawa those same qualities," said Mr. Winters, "and is representing the constituency of Queens in a manner that brings honor and credit to it, as well as to P.E.I."

On the matter of national progress under the Liberal Government, Mr. Winters said that despite the fact that there were no promises made in the last federal election campaign, there is already a substantial record of achievement. "We enacted a piece of social legislation which was needed and which will bring relief to a class of Canadians which are so badly in need of it, and that is those unfortunate people who are permanently and totally disabled. The Liberal Party is characterized by an outstanding program of social legislation," he said.

Referring to housing legislation he said money had been made available for residential construction. "A billion dollar a year business, providing employment for one-quarter million men all the year round."

Regarding Trans Canada Highway construction, the name of P. E.I. leads all the rest, said Mr. Winters.

"Today we see in the paper time after time that this organization or that, or this province or that, is calling for a program of public works. Well we have already set before the provincial governments the type of public works which are available to them, and if they wish to take advantage of them there will be ample opportunity to do so."

"This is one of the provinces that has done so, and I am always proud to tell people from coast to coast: just what Prince Edward Island has done," he added.

"We hope to be able to do something about the airport at Charlottetown, a project which Mr. Matheson is keeping before us almost day and night," said Mr. Winters.

POLICE COURT — In Summerside Police Court yesterday morning before Magistrate E. H. Strong, Q.C., two Summerside men charged with stealing 21 bags of sugar between November 19th and November 24th from Rogers and Arnett, wholesalers of Summerside were remanded until Friday, November 26th. A third man was arrested shortly before noon yesterday in connection with the theft and a fourth was still being sought last evening. The sugar was stolen from a railway box car last weekend and eight of the bags were found later under a warehouse belonging to Smallmans Ltd. A round the clock vigil by Summerside police resulted in the arrest of one of three men who approached the warehouse Tuesday night and attempted to remove the bags of sugar. Sgt. Milton Doyle arrested one of the three but the other two escaped. However, one of the suspects was arrested later Tuesday night by Constable Stewart Berry and Constable Keith Champion and shortly before noon yesterday Cst. Elmer Matheson nabbed the third and put him in custody.

Statement Issued by Raceway Directors Explains Company Position and Asks for Support

"Some concern has been expressed by the public with regard to the operation of the Summerside Rink and the prospect of having an artificial ice plant installed for the coming winter season.

"The Directors of the Summerside Exhibition and Raceway Limited were persuaded to undertake the building of a rink in answer to a persistent public demand for such a structure to provide recreational and community welfare facilities for the youth of the Town. This project was attempted after the completion of the Raceway and it was anticipated that the public would back up the efforts of the Directors by buying stock to enable them to complete the financing of the proposition. The combined cost of Raceway and Skating Rink is approximately \$300,000.00. This has been financed to date as follows:—

"The original five Directors have subscribed and paid in \$18,000.00 each, and have made themselves jointly and severally liable to the Bank in the amount of \$36,000.00. In addition the firm of one of the Directors, namely Curran & Briggs Limited, has accepted a mortgage on the Raceway property in the amount of \$24,000.00. Substantially therefore, the five Directors have contributed or made themselves responsible for contributing an amount of \$150,000.00. The Town of Summerside has contributed an amount of \$100,000.00, and holds a first mortgage on the Rink property for \$65,470.00.

"To pay off the present outstanding liabilities and install an artificial ice plant, would require an additional \$80,000.00—or \$65,000.00 after the \$15,000.00 withheld by the Town in connection with the Rink is paid in.

"Mr. R. T. Dodds, Investment Dealer of Summerside has consented to look after the sale of the stock, which is presently available, and we solicit your co-operation."

"The present Directors cannot, nor should the public expect them to go any further towards providing necessary additional financing.

"The Capital set up of the Company, consists of 75,000 common stock — 50,000 Class "A" Preferred and 50,000 Class "B" Preferred. All the Common stock has been taken by the Directors, through the amounts paid in by them, and the Class "B" Preferred issued to the Town in respect of the \$50,000.00 grant. Of the 50,000 Class "A" Preferred, 4,000 has already been subscribed and paid for by some interested citizens, mainly outside the Town of Summerside. If, however, the balance of the Class "A" Preferred stock, namely \$46,000.00, was subscribed and taken up by our citizens, it would enable the Directors to pay off the pressing liabilities, and contract for the installation of the artificial ice plant. They feel that with a successful winter season and a reasonably good racing season next year, the other liabilities could be looked after in the ordinary course of events.

"The Company owns one of the finest Racetracks and Rink properties in Eastern Canada and there is no reason, once the outstanding liabilities are looked after, why the same could not be operated as a successful business venture.

"However it is urgent that public support be forthcoming not later than December 31st, 1954, so that financial plans can be formulated for the coming season.

Island Sailor Wins Naval Quiz Jackpot

ON BOARD HMCS QUEBEC — PO Harvey MacAusland, of Emsdale, P.E.I. and Shannon Park, N.S., collected an extra \$26 to spend when the cruiser H.M.C.S. Quebec visited Rio de Janeiro early in November, thanks to his knowledge of current affairs. The money comprised a jackpot from the weekly quiz run by the education officer, Instructor Lt.-Cdr. William F. McGown, of Montreal and Dartmouth.

Lt.-Cdr. McGown selects a man at random and interviews him the following week. Each question is worth a dollar, with the money going into the jackpot each time a question is not answered properly. Four right answers out of five allows the contestant a chance at this jackpot.

PO MacAusland got a perfect score, plus the \$21 jackpot. He numbered NATO member nations as 14 identified Israel and Indonesia as two countries for which the UN arranged ceasefires and then UN membership, identified the Martin B-61 Matadors to bolster NATO European defences as pilotless bombers, named the Mackenzie River as Canada's longest, identified Ralph Campney as Canada's Defence Minister and, for the jackpot, named Walter Harris as the new Finance Minister.
