

Maritime Tourist Bureaus  
To Mail Out Questionnaires

Maritime Provinces tourist bureaus will mail out a total of 45,000 questionnaires within the next month to tourists who registered at provincial travel bureaus.

P.E.I. Travel Bureau director General Fraser said yesterday that the decision was made at a meeting of the three provincial travel directors in Montreal.

Mr. Fraser said that the questionnaires will be compiled by a Nova Scotia government economist and the final report will be the result of a uniform survey of tourist statistics for the Maritimes.

Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will each send out about 20,000 questionnaires while this province will send out between 3,000 and 5,000.

Continued will be such questions as "what made you decide to come to the province?"

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Ferry Terminal  
Rest Rooms Will  
Remain Open

Beginning Dec. 1, the department of transport rest-rooms at Borden and Cape Tormentine will remain open 24 hours a day for the convenience of passengers using the ferry service.

According to provincial transportation director Graham Brown, this is the first time in the history of the service, except in emergencies, that the rest-rooms have remained open all night.

The rest-rooms will stay open on a 24-hour basis until May 5. The government has been pressing for the continuous opening of the rest-rooms and was advised recently that the department of transport gave the CNR permission to keep the rest-rooms open.

During the winter, the ferry service will operate all night, carrying freight.

Coffee vending machines are provided in the restrooms.

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Butter Production This Year  
High, But Will Miss Record

Butter production to the end of October totalled 5,299,123 pounds, which is more than 200,000 pounds over last year, but there is no longer a possibility that a new record may be achieved this year, it was revealed by Dairy Superintendent Henry Macdonald yesterday.

A combination of unusually high pasture through the summer and early fall months had pushed production well beyond normal, but the falling forage of the latter half and the poor quality of hay has already forced production down, it was explained.

Last month's production of 619,123 pounds was still well above the 562,236 pounds for the same month a year ago, though production this month is down sharply, it was learned.

Cheese production is 12,417 pounds last month compared with 72,287 pounds for the same month in 1961 but the total make to date of 814,000 pounds this year compares with 820,287 made to this date a year ago.
