ODD FELLOWS NATAL DAY.—The Oddfellows of this Island celebrated their Natal Day with special honors. At a quarter to 3 o'clock, they marched from St. Lawrence Lodge Room to St. Paul's Church, where Divine Service was performed by the Rev. D. Fitzgerald. After services they formed in a procession, and marched through some of the principal streets of the city. In the evening there was an Entertainment in the Market Hall, which was very well attended. The performance was well opened by the Charlottetown Amateur Orchestra, composed of Messrs. Vinnicombe, Stranberg, Worth, Fletcher and Young. Mr. Herbert Beer sang a Solo in his usual spirited manner. A chorus entitled "Friendship, Love and Truth," by the Brethren, was very good. The stump speeches, jokes and songs of the Charlottetown Amateur Minstrels were very entertaining and seemed to be well appreciated by the audience.

OBITUARY.

We have this week to record the death of the founder of this paper, Mr. Joseph Bertram. Mr. Bertram when quite young entered the old Island office to learn the printing business. Here he remained for nine years, during which time he had acquired a thorough knowledge of everything connected with newspaper printing as then practised on the Island. At the same time his many good qualities made him many friends, and chief among them his old master, Mr. Ings. In 1863 Mr. Bertram took up his abode in this town, where he continued to reside till his death, which took place last Tuesday morning after a painful illness of some months duration. He started a job printing office in 1861, and in 1865, in conjunction with Mr. Henry Barnard, of Charlottetown, started the Summerside Journal. A short time afterwards Mr. Barnard left the country, and Mr. Bertram thus became sole owner of the Journal, and the paper was conducted under his sole management until 1870, when he was joined by Mr. Charles Strong, as a partner. This partnership continued until 1873, when the Journal was bought by Graves and McMurtry. During Mr. Bertram's connection with the Journal two most important questions came up for consideration, for all practical purposes, it may be said, for the first time. And Mr. Bertram's paper was the first on this Island to advocate a railroad for this country. It was also the first to advocate confederation. Both these questions were at first very unpopular, and it required more than the ordinary share of public spirit to espouse them. And Mr. Bertram had incurred a good deal of public displeasure for his many and disinterested advocacy of those great measures. But public opinion has greatly changed since then, and we have no doubt but that the noble course Mr. Bertram felt it his duty to pursue in connection with them will greatly help to preserve his memory in the recollections of his countrymen.—Journal.

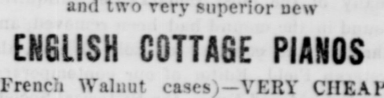
