

# Red Cross Committee Hears Gerard Doucette

Highlight of the first of this school year's meetings of the P.E.I. Red Cross Youth Advisory Committee held last week at Red Cross headquarters in Charlottetown was a report given by Gerard Doucette of Tignish regional high school on his attendance at an International Red Cross Study Seminar this past summer in Poland. Gerard was one of the two Canadian Red Cross delegates to this leadership training centre at which there were representatives from thirteen countries. He described the activities of the Study Seminar, his travels in England, Holland, Poland, and his visit to the League of Red Cross Societies and the International Red Cross Committee in Geneva in a most manner.

Presiding at the well attended meeting was Dr. K.A. Parker, chairman of the P.E.I. Red Cross Youth advisory committee which is comprised of the following members — Rev. Sr. Mary Ida, C.S.M., and Helen Yeo, directors of teacher training at St. Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales University respectively; J.A.S. Williams, director of curriculum of the P.E.I. department of education; Sister Flora Mary Macdonald, teacher of the high school Red Cross council at Birchwood; Mrs. Frank Ross of Parkdale; Wilson Ross and Merritt Callaghan, supervisors of schools; Bernice Rowland, director of public health nursing; Daniel Macdonald, teacher-sponsor of high school Red Cross at Morell regional high; Rev. Donald MacLennan, United Church minister at Mt. Stewart and St. Peter's Bay; Mrs. W.W. Reid, director of Red Cross Youth for P.E.I., and J. Arsenault, provincial Red Cross commissioner. Francis MacNeill, supervisor of schools for Summerside is the vice-chairman of this advisory committee, which also has several other members serving on sub-committees.

**DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

The committee also heard a report given by the director, Mrs. W.W. Reid, on some of the activities carried on by Red Cross Youth during the summer months including the successful Bicycle Rodeo in which some 60 schools participated, and the high school Red Cross Leadership Training Centre for the Atlantic provinces held at Montgomery Hall in Charlottetown in August. Mrs. Reid explained that an innovation carried out at this year's Training Centre was that most of the planning and carrying out of the activities were the responsibility of the ten junior leaders drawn from the four Atlantic provinces and headed by Nancy George of Charlottetown. The Director stated that the consensus of opinion expressed in the evaluation done by the delegates at the conclusion of the centre revealed that they considered it to be the "best ever".

"Health and Education were stressed last year — the first in the 'Five Year Development Plan' being undertaken by Red Cross Youth around the world," Mrs. Reid said as she told the meeting of the "To Do" boxes and the "Health" and "School" bits contributed by young Red Cross members throughout the province for their counterparts in the underdeveloped areas of the world. "This year," Mrs. Reid said, "Safety" is being featured in all its different phases."

It was announced that Nancy George, presently a student at Prince of Wales College, will be the P.E.I. delegate representing Red Cross Youth at the "Centennial International Development Program" to be held in Oshawa, Ontario from October 21st-23rd.

Also discussed at the meeting was the matter of the selection of the four P.E.I. delegates to "Rendezvous '67" which is the Canadian Red Cross Society's major Centennial project. Some 100 representatives of 50 countries have already indicated that they will be in attendance at "Rendezvous '67" to be held at Carleton University, Ottawa, from August 13th-21st, along with 300 Canadian representatives. Previous to this Seminar, delegates from these 50 countries will be given two weeks' hospitality in Canadian homes — both rural and urban — across Canada. Following the Seminar all participants will be taken to "Expo '67" in Montreal, also to Upper Canada Village, the St.

Lawrence Seaway, and Niagara Falls before returning home. Application forms for "Rendezvous '67" are to be sent to all high schools, and to former Training Centre delegates who are now attending universities, and when these are returned to Mrs. Reid, a selection committee drawn from the advisory council will choose the Island's four representatives.

## \$25 Penalty Is Imposed

A fine of \$25 and costs was levied on Ernest Nose of Summerside when he appeared in Provincial Magistrate's Court Monday morning on a charge of having in his possession 121 under-sized oysters, each measuring less than three inches.

Three others charged with violating the fisheries act had their cases adjourned until October 26 at three o'clock in the afternoon at Alberton.

The three — charged with fishing lobsters in a closed area — are Edmond Joseph Peters and Alvin Joseph Peters, both of Tignish Shore, and Joseph Edwin DesRoches of St. Felix.

Previously a plea of not guilty had been entered in the cases. G. Bruce MacDonald is representing the department of fisheries, and Melville Campbell is counsel for the defence.

Joseph Aloysius Arsenault of CFB Summerside was fined \$75 fine and costs when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester MacDonald for care and control of an automobile while impaired. The alternative was 15 days in county jail.

John Fitzgerald of MacNeills Mills, was convicted of carrying more than three adults in the cab of his truck, contrary to section 202 of the highway traffic act, and he was fined \$10 and costs.

Three people pleaded guilty to speeding, each paying \$10 and costs. They were William MacInnis, CFB Summerside, Ivan Pineau, and Hillar MacKinnon, Summerside.

## Potato Yield May Be Record

Chessel Irving, Murray Harbor, has achieved what is believed to be an all-time record for potato production in this province, with 800 bushels of Netted Gems this year.

Last night Mr. Irving confirmed for The Guardian the story of the tremendous yield. Nobody could recall anything, nearly that high in this province before.

The Murray Harbor man had 200 acres of potatoes to harvest in all and he has all but 18 acres harvested to date.

Mr. Irving used 1,200 to 1,300 pounds of 12-24-24 fertilizer in the 22 acre field at Abney where the Gems are grown. That would be the equivalent of 2,400 to 2,600 pounds of the 6-12-12 mixture that is more commonly used for potato production.

All of Mr. Irving's potatoes are good this year—He's getting from 400 to 500 bushels per acre on the average, he said, clear of the tremendous Netted Gem yield.

Mr. Irving irrigated the Gems four times during the summer. He used irrigation three times on some of the other potatoes, and only once on another field where it is hard to get the water to.

The Gems were planted about the first of May, Mr. Irving said. He replanted about 25 acres of potatoes last spring, after a late spring frost had apparently killed what was planted on that many acres. "But all of the potatoes grew, I don't think I need have replanted any of them," he told The Guardian last night.

**SHIPMENTS BEGIN**

Potato shipments are underway in considerable volume though harvesting is still underway. The first rush of cars to Prince Edward Island came over last weekend, a Canadian National Railway report indicates.
