

Tomorrow Is Air Force Day



When the RCAF holds its sixth annual Air Force Day on Saturday (June 14th), many stations across the country will be holding open house once again to allow the public to see men and women of the RCAF at work, equipment exhibits and in some cases air shows. With Canada's continued expansion of the armed forces, the RCAF has stepped up activity in every phase as depicted in the above photograph. With the F-86E Sabre jets (top left) in full production, the RCAF is rapidly re-forming old wartime squadrons and retraining them for service at home and overseas. Para-rescue training in the RCAF (top right) has increased with more nurses taking the rugged training and qualifying beside their male counterparts as rescue specialists. The new hangar (centre left) typifies construction work that is a feature at nearly every RCAF station. Among Canada's chief contributions to NATO is the training of European pilots and navigators at RCAF stations. Students representing four NATO nations (center) symbolize NATO's prime function to support peace throughout the world. "Oh, 'Tis Spring"

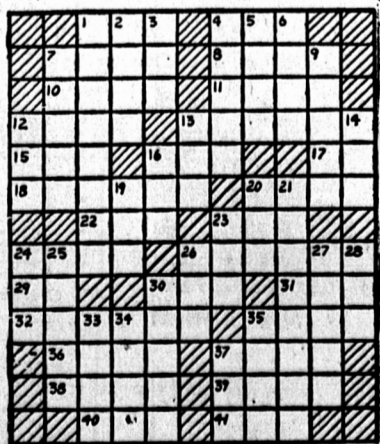
Oh, there's a lightness in the air,

On May 15, 1952, death claimed West Newton's oldest resident in the person of Mrs. Francis Corr, born at Kinkora eighty-four years ago, the daughter of the late Thomas Duffy and Catherine Creighan. Previous to her marriage the deceased spent some years as a waitress in the service of the late William Callbeck, Bedeque, where her deep sense of Christian ideals won for her the admiration and esteem of a wide circle of friends. Surviving also are two sisters, Miss Elizabeth Duffy, Haverhill, Mass., Mrs. John E. Mulligan, South Freetown and one brother, James, South Freetown.

Her funeral which was largely attended was held on May 18 to St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora. Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. Sylvester Gallant who also performed the service at the grave. Her mortal remains were tenderly laid to rest beside her husband who predeceased her twelve years ago. Fall bearers were Messrs. Clayton McCabe, Walter Smith, John M. 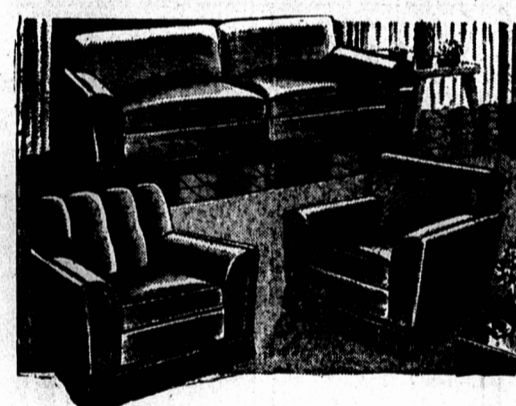
