The snow-fall of last night was followed by sleet and rain today, and it was consequently disagreeable both overhead and under foot. But this did not put a damper upon the enthusiasm of our fellow-citizens of Irish birth or descent, and the turnout of the two societies this forenoon was in the highest degree creditable.

High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father McDougall, assisted by Fathers Ignace McDonald and Ignace McNeil as deacon and sub-deacon respectively. Rev. A. McAulay, of Morell, was the preacher, and his discourse ranks with the best ever delivered in the Cathedral.

On arrival at their hall, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered to His Honor, Lieut. Governor Howland for his attendance, to which he replied in fitting terms. Three rousing cheers were then given to His Honor, and the League of the Cross Band, after which the society dispersed.

ST. PATRICK'S AT ALBERTON. At Alberton the church service this morning was more than usually imposing. The western clergy were all present to assist Father Burke, the zealous pastor. Rev. F. X. Gallant was the celebrant in the Solemn High Mass celebrated at 9 o'clock. A most impressive panegyric was preached by Rev. Dr. Chaisson. The splendid church choir, supplemented by a first rate orchestra under K. E. Johnston's leadership, produced the best of music. A great concourse of people attended, the members of the League of the Cross, the League of the Sacred Heart, the Confraternity of the Holy Family and the C.M.B.A. as well as many others approaching the Holy Table. The "wearing of the green" was quite general, and everybody present was "proud he was an Irishman's son."

Charlottetown, March 7, 1896. A despatch received at the Navy Department, Washington, says that the battleship Indiana had met with an accident to her machinery while leaving Hampton Roads for Port Royal, which she returned here from being docked at that place on Thursday. The accident consisted in the bending of her valve stem, and several days will be required to make repairs. This is the fourth breakdown of the Indiana, only recently put in commission.

A growth in the spirit of tolerance is illustrated by an incident connected with the death of the late Protestant Archbishop of Armagh. When his death became known the bell of the Catholic Cathedral was tolled both in the forenoon and in the evening, and the Catholic Cardinal Logan, who was in Rome, sent a telegram, saying that he was "gladly and gratefully" conveying his condolence to the Primate's family. The Cardinal was primate of the funeral by his Administrator. Such facts indicate a better spirit in Irish ecclesiastical circles.

A lightning matrimonial act was performed at Kankon, Ind., a few days ago, that is believed to break the record. The feat of changing her name three times in three minutes was successfully accomplished by Olive Smith. At 2:45 she went and obtained a divorce from Francis M. Truder, from there she repaired to the clerk's office and secured a license to marry Joseph N. Tyler, and before the ink was dry on divorce or license she was pronouncing the vows of matrimony that made Mrs. Tyler. In the divorce her maiden name of Smith was re-tore, giving her three names for three minutes.

The New York World's correspondent in Constantinople writes that the Patriarch of the Armenian Catholics, had sent the Vatican a startling report, declaring that, during the recent disorders in Asiatic Turkey, a large number of soldiers and sailors had been massacred, and that the Armenian Government had been in office England had been in the midst of a hurricane of foreign complications, blowing from every quarter. Their foreign policy had been hampered by the Armenian Government, and the budget debates, the "splendid isolation" of which the Government was so proud, was the outcome of jingoism. The situation in Constantinople had never been so grave within the memory of living men. The Armenian difficulty, he said, was a legacy of Beaconsfield's statesmanship. Venezuela, he pointed out, was the gravest difficulty which threatened the Government in December in place of Lord Salisbury's despatches. No word should escape his lips, however, to embarrass the Government in obtaining a peaceful and honorable settlement.
