

Keefe Drug Retains Five Pin Bowling Crown Here

The Keefe Drug team of Charlottetown Saturday retained their Maritime Five Pin Bowling Crown by racking up a total of 28 of a possible 32 points in the annual tournament, play in which was completed on Saturday afternoon at the Rollaway Alleys. Barbour's BA's from Charlottetown took runner-up position in the two-day tournament with a team from the Shearwater base in Dartmouth taking third place.

A member of the runner-up team, Wilf Shepherd scored the high single for the tournament of 413. Second high went to Don MacDonald, a member of the winners, with 410. Both scores were registered in the first day of the tournament. George Kays of the Keefe Drug team had a high average of 275.0.

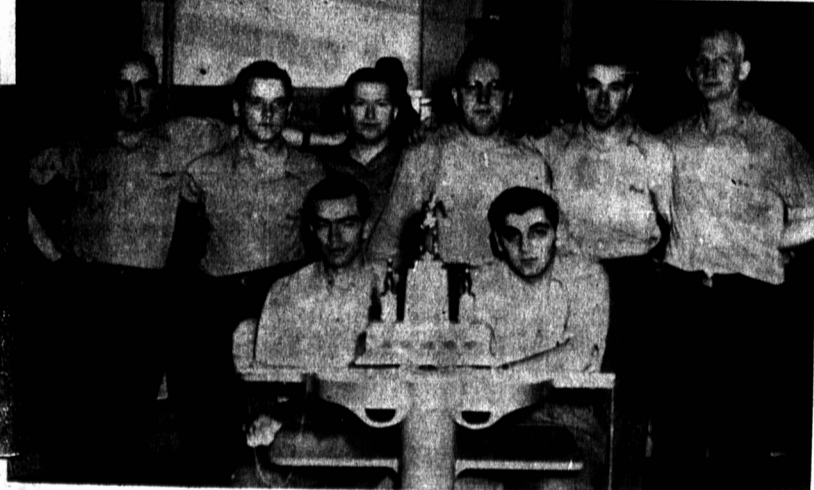
The winning team received the Seaman's Beverages Co. Ltd. Trophy which was donated for the first time this year and will be presented annually to the winner of the tournament. It was decided at a business meeting and banquet at the Queen Hotel on Saturday evening that the next Maritime Five Pin Tournament will be held in Moncton in 1956.

Red Wings Down Canadiens 4-2 In Opener, Also Equal Record For Consecutive Wins

DETROIT, (CP)—Detroit Red Wings came from behind twice Sunday night to turn back Montreal Canadiens 4-2 in the opening game of their Stanley Cup final. Marty Pavelich scored the tie-breaker late in the third period on a galloping breakaway and Ted Lindsay settled it 18 seconds from the end with a lift into the open net.

It was a bitter, bruising battle in which the Red Wings twice turned on their power plays full tilt to catch up with the Montrealers who went in front in the second period and again in the third on goals by hard-working Floyd Curry.

Alex Delvecchio pulled Detroit even in the middle period and Vic Stasiuk again in the third before Pavelich put the Red Wings in front for the first time while his own team was shorthanded.

Up to that time it was pretty much of a toss up between the teams, taking up where they left off last season—a seven-game final that went to the Red Wings.

Canadiens showed lots of fight, but were always under terrific pressure every time the Detroit power play went into action. The Red Wings led few opportunities pass and had lots of drive down to the finish.

The victory was Detroit's 14th in a row—nine league games and five in the cup series—tying a National Hockey League record set in the 1929-30 season by Boston Bruins, who amassed their string of 14 in league schedule games. Pavelich's big goal at 17:07 of the final period came with a suddenness that sent the crowd of 13,862 into a frenzy of acclaim. Newspapers and programs were tossed to the ice.

Less than a minute earlier Howe had been sent off for slashing and Canadiens were storming into the Detroit end trying to crack through and get a third goal past Terry Sawchuk in the Detroit nets.

The puck flew out from the wild melee and Pavelich snared it at centre ice and was away all alone. He pulled the trigger on goalie Jacques Plante from about 15 feet and the game was as good as over right there.

With a minute to go, Coach Dick Irvin of Montreal pulled Plante from the nets. The change for an extra forward was made on the fly.

Howe fought for the puck along the boards but couldn't get an open shot but he was able to get it over to Lindsay who let fly from near the blue line just before Doug Harvey tried to check him.
