THE BURNING OF THE MORTGAGE

The Y. M. C. A. Celebrates Its Release From Debt by Burning the Mortgage Papers

At the Y. M. C. A. Hall last night a meeting was held to celebrate the paying off the mortgage, which for a number of years, has been a shackle on the institution. An interested audience assembled to decide the fate of the iniquitous document, which has at times caused anxiety to those entrusted in past years with the administration of the Association.

A pleasant program was carried out. Prof. Waite's orchestra gave an opening selection which was followed by the rendition of some records on the Victor talking machine, and two very enjoyable recitations by Mr. Shaw, who interprets Dr. Drummond capitally. Then followed addresses by President Louison, His Worship Mayor Paton, Governor McKinnon, Judge Fitzgerald, Lt. Col. Moore, W. C. Turner, (the last three former presidents of the Association.) A very fine solo was sweetly sung by Miss Maud Down, Prof. Earle accompanying.

Henry J. Cundall, who has been a member of the Association since its institution over fifty years ago inspected the mortgage deed, and asked to have the papers framed or preserved. This motion was seconded by D. B. Stewart, and put to the meeting. About ten supported it. Judge Fitzgerald was very sympathetic in his desire that the mortgage should be burned, and the meeting seemed to be in sympathy with him. The matter being submitted to the audience for disposal, the vote was largely in favor of burning the mortgage.

Mrs. T. G. Taylor, the President of the Ladies' Auxiliary, set a match to the mortgage papers which were held on a tray by the President. The audience stood and sang Praise God from whom all Blessings Flow.

The ladies then furnished light refreshments, and Secy. Archibald happily moved a vote of thanks to the ladies and thanked them sincerely on behalf of the Association for their noble efforts in helping to pay of the mortgage.

Mayor Paton proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Archibald for his faithful work among the young men of this city since he came to Charlottetown, and Judge Fitzgerald, also spoke along this line. Next Sunday there will be a thanksgiving service in the Y. M. C. A. Hall at which Rev. Mr. Dobson will address a message meeting for men and women.

IRISHMEN ARE INDIGNANT

ST. JOHN, June 4.—There was a warm discussion at the regular meeting of the Hibernian Knights lately. Several members took occasion to protest vigorously against the posters that have been put up about the cry advertising the "Irish Pawnbrokers" which is billed to appear at the Opera House next week. These posters were referred to as vile caricatures of the Irish race and insulting and offensive in the extreme to the Irish people of the city. A strong resolution was unanimously passed condemning the theatrical management and calling upon all Irishmen as lovers of fair play, to refrain from attending the performance.

TRYING TO SOLVE CREAMER MYSTERY

MONCTON N. B. June 4—Sheriff McQueen, who was in town today, stated the authorities were making no effort at present to clear up the Creamer children mystery. The theory of kidnaping, he says, has largely disappeared and the people to the lower end of the country have settled down to the belief that the children are dead. The sheriff's own opinion is that the bodies of the children will yet be found in the woods. Constable Charles Thomas, of Moncton, has been spending the last few days searching for the children but, at a late report, he had nothing new to add to the mystery.

SENATORS VIEW ON DIVORCE

On motion for the third reading of the bill granting a divorce to Harriette Wesley Baker, Senator Power moved an amendment demanding that the husband and respondent, Frances Shaw Baker, may not lawfully marry again during the life of Harriette Wesley Baker.
