

Owen Sound Mercurys Capture Allan Cup

New York Giants Romp To 17-3 Victory Over St. Louis Cards In Game Yesterday

The awakened New York Giants rocked a makeshift St. Louis Cardinals with a total of 21 hits Wednesday in a 17-3 romp that tied the major league run and hit total for the season.

Ray Noble, the Cuban catcher, hit two homers and Bobby Thomson one off the parade of Cardinal throwers in the National League game at New York's Polo Grounds. Al Dark added a double, triple and two singles. Dark, Noble and Whitey Lockman each had four hits.

Sal Maglie rode home easy with his third straight win. The curvballing righthander lost his first two 1951 starts.

Everybody hit, although Thomson waited until the last time up to hammer the 21st Giant hit, his fifth homer. New York Yankees and Chicago White Sox previously scored 17 runs this year and the Yanks also collected 21 hits in a rout of St. Louis Browns.

With eight Cards bedded by the "flu" manager Marty Marion fielded a "rinky-dink" lineup. An all-rookie infield and Sam Musial in centre field resulted. Max Lanier had nothing and was dispatched in short order. Ted Wilks, Erv Cusak and Al Brazie didn't do much better.

Musial left the game in the fourth, suffering from a heavy cold. Enos Slaughter also retired in the fifth.

Capable relief pitching by Clyde King helped Brooklyn shade Chicago, 5-4, in a National League game at Ebbetts Field. Cal Abrams, fighting for the left field job, snapped a 2-2 tie with a two-run double in the sixth. King replaced Chris Van Cuyk in the second.

Johnny Schmitz, an old Dodger jinx, was routed in the second inning. He gave way to Turk Lown, ex-Brooklyn farmhand, who was the loser.

Newhouse Has Shutout

The only day game in the American League saw Detroit's Hal Newhouse shut out Washington with seven hits 4-0 for his second win.

Steve Souchock, starting his second game in left field for the Tigers, blasted a homerun in the fourth of the contest at Detroit.

That was one of three hits yielded by Al Sima in the first seven innings. The Tigers added two more off Joe Haynes in the eighth.

Night Games

Stalwart pitching by a couple of veterans, Eddie Lopat of New York Yankees and Vern Bickford of Boston Braves, figured mightily in victories by their teams in major league games Wednesday night.

Lopat was equally effective at bat as the Yankees pounded out eight safeties to defeat Cleveland Indians 9-2 in an American League game at Cleveland. He drove in five runs and hurled six-hit ball.

Righthander Bickford limited Cincinnati Reds to two hits while gaining his fifth straight victory and second shutout for the Braves by a 4-0 margin in a night National League encounter at Boston.

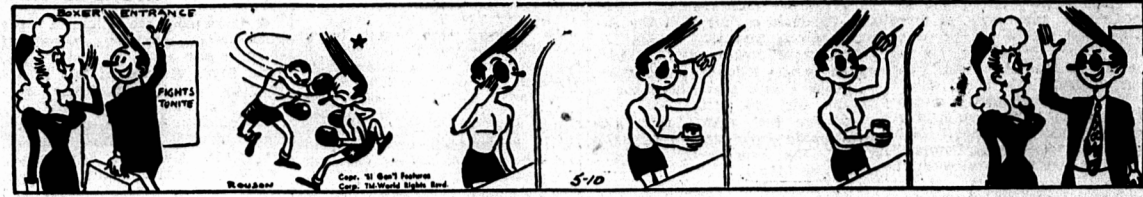
The Yankees' victory snapped their two-game losing streak and increased their league lead over Washington to two games. It was Lopat's fifth victory against no defeats. His string of innings in which he had not allowed an earned run was snapped at 32, however, when the Tribe scored twice in the fourth.

Bob Lemon, who was knocked out of the box in the sixth after yielding six hits, was the loser. Bickford was in fine form at Boston giving the Reds only two bases on balls and striking out nine. The first-pace Tribesmen collected six hits off Howie Fox and Harry Perkowski but they included four two-baggers and Earl Torgerson's homer with none aboard in the eighth inning.

Ed Bellagrin's 10th inning single with two out drove Eddie Waitkus home with the run that gave Philadelphia Phillies a 6-5 National League victory over Pittsburgh Pirates in a floodlight contest at Philadelphia.

A pair of Browns errors and doubles by Carl Scheib and Sam Chapman in the tenth gave Philadelphia Athletics six runs and an 8-2 overtime victory over St. Louis Browns at St. Louis. The A's trailed twice in the night game but Eddie Joost homered in the top of the ninth to tie the count.

Harry Poulton, Island lightweight champ, will also appear on the same card at Saint John in an eight-round, semifinal attraction, but Harry's opponent has not yet been named. The smooth-punching, shifty Poulton will be seen on the same card as Cobey on May 22nd in a six-round semifinal against Harry Schultz of Dartmouth. Poulton will also leave on Sunday for the Monday night scrap at Saint John.

Irish Bob Murphy, free-swinging light heavyweight contender from San Diego, tonight scored a technical knockout victory over Danny Nardico, Tampa, Fla., in the fourth round of their scheduled 10-round-

er in the Chicago Stadium. The bruising battle was halted by referee Johnny Behr after one minute and 58 seconds of the fourth. Nardico was bleeding from a cut under his right eye, from his mouth and had no defence from Murphy's savage blows.

Murphy will be rewarded with a bout with Jake Lamotta in New York Yankee Stadium next June 27.

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MONTREAL, May 9 (CP) — The Canadian Rugby Union is buying a \$12,000 tarpaulin to protect the University of Toronto Stadium field for the 1951 Grey Cup final.

Meyer Inaky, president of the C.R.U., said tonight the tarpaulin has been ordered from an Ottawa manufacturer. Need of a tarpaulin was emphasized last autumn when the Grey Cup game was played in mud, water and snow. The covering, similar to ones used in the United States, will be made of a waterproof canvas. Its cost will be shared by the Eastern Big Four, the Western Conference and Varsity Stadium.

GLASGOW, May 9 (AP) — Peter Keenan, 22-year-old Glasgow fighter, won the British bantamweight boxing championship tonight by knocking out defending champion Danny O'Sullivan of London in the sixth round. Both weighed 117½ pounds.

Stage Sizzling Third Period Finish To Edge Fort Frances In 7th Game

OWEN SOUND, Ont., May 9 (CP) — Owen Sound Mercurys staged a sizzling third period finish to bring this Georgian Bay City's first Allan Cup championship in history by defeating Fort Frances Canadians 3-1. It was the most thrilling struggle in the entire seven-game series with both clubs fighting every inch.

Pat McReavy broke a two-period scoreless draw when he beat goalie Barefoot at 3:26. Burlington and Bukachski put the Sounders three up before Elzensoff tallied the lone Canadian marker with six minutes of the game remaining.

Following the game George Dudley, secretary-manager of the C.A.H.A., presented the fabled Allan Cup to Mercurys captain Pat McReavy. The John Ross Robertson Trophy, emblematic of O.H.A. senior A supremacy, was presented to goalie Bob Gillson by Tory Gregg, second vice-president of the O.H.A.

The Mercurys thus brought Owen Sound its second national team championship in seven months. Last October the Crescents won the Mann Cup in the Canadian senior lacrosse final. That series too went seven games. Tommy Burlington, Harry Kazarian, Bill Allum, Doug Gillespie and Freddie Smith were members of both championship

A sellout crowd of 2,300 fans saw a fast, action-packed game break wide open early in the third period when Doug Gillespie sent McReavy into the clear at the Canadians' blue line with a long pass. McReavy made no mistake, drilling past Barefoot from 16 feet.

A change of lines on the move led to the Mercurys' second tally just past the halfway mark. In-goldy stepped on the ice, worked his way down left wing and dumped a pass to the open wing, Burlington, who followed him from the bench, stepped in front to beat Barefoot cleanly with a low shot.

Bukachski was left uncovered two minutes later to fire home the third marker from dead centre on McReavy's pass. Bukachski earlier had pried the puck loose from Irving with his fore-checking.

Half a minute after Bukachski's goal, Elzensoff grabbed a loose puck to Rob Gillson of a shutout but the Mercurys checked the Canucks into the ice after that. Four minor penalties, three to Fort Frances, were handed out in the first two periods but the teams were at full strength throughout the final chapter. Fort Frances had an edge in shots on goal, 33 to 15, but many of their drives were from well

Stan Musial Joins St. Louis Cardinals' Sick List

NEW YORK, May 9 (AP) — Stan Musial joined the St. Louis Cardinals' long sick list today to raise the total of ailing Redbirds to eight again.

It was a pathetic lineup that manager Marty Marion presented today for the Cards' clash with New York Giants. The starting cast included only three regulars — Stan Musial, Enos Slaughter and Joe Garagiola. The Giants mowed down their injury-riddled opponents, 17-3.

Musial, who came to the park complaining of a "burning in my chest", was forced to leave in the Giants' half of the fourth inning. Musial hurried to his hotel to join pitchers Howie Pollet, George Mungler and Harry Brecheen; infielders Rocky Nelson, Reg Schenck, coach Mike Ryan and club trainer Doc Weaver. All are victims of the flu. Catcher Bill Sarni, another flu victim, recovered and donned a uniform today.

"If we can get a great house with this bout," Greene said, "the rest of the country will look to Newark for boxing."

N.B.A. Begins Fight Against I.B.C. Monopoly

NEWARK, N. J., May 9 (AP) — Abe J. Greene, National Boxing Association commissioner, warned the International Boxing Club today that the forthcoming Charlie Fusari-Tony Janiro fight is only the "opening wedge" in a fight against the I. B. C. boxing "monopoly."

Taking advantage of the opportunity offered by the ceremonies involved in signing up the match, Greene predicted a "great fight" which would "show New York and Chicago boxing interests that we mean business." Greene also is boxing commissioner of New Jersey.

The ceremonies were held in Fusari's restaurant here. Willie (TVZ Beag) Gilzenberg, one of the promoters, had to climb on a chair to make himself heard over the hubbub of boxing people and regular customers, but he got across an announcement that the bout would be 10 rounds in Ruppert Stadium Thursday, June 7.

Gilzenberg said there would be no television or radio broadcast unless the promoters got the "right offer—something like \$25-000 or so."

There was a rumor here that Cleveland, desperate for relief pitching, is interested in Joe Page, the world champions' sore-armed 33-year-old lefthander.

Yankees Discuss Player Deals

CLEVELAND, May 9 (AP) — New York Yankees admitted today they are discussing deals with several clubs but denied that one had been closed with St. Louis Cardinals. A report from New York said the National League club had purchased third-baseman Bill Johnson for the waiver price.

George Weiss, Yankees general manager, said by telephone from New York: "I have discussed deals with several clubs but none has been concluded. Bill Johnson has not been sold to the Cardinals."

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Rule Re Overtime For Toronto And Valleyfield Series

TORONTO, May 9 (CP) — Professional-style overtime periods will be used, if necessary, in deciding the Alexander Cup finals between Toronto St. Michael's Monarchs and Valleyfield Braves. The mid-May series, with crowds depleted by competing springtime sports attractions, ends this week.

A 10-minute overtime period will be followed by an intermission, the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association announced today. Further overtime will be in 20-minute periods, with the first goal deciding the contest.

George Dudley, the association's secretary-manager, said the remaining games in the major hockey championship series will have a two-game value.

That would mean that St. Michael's, who lead the seven-game series 3-1 with one game tied, could win the title in tomorrow night's game in Montreal. A sixth and sudden-death game, if Valleyfield wins tomorrow, will be played in Toronto Saturday. The Monarchs defeated Valleyfield 6-1 here last night.
