LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

NEXT YEAR.—The Maritime Medical Association will meet in Halifax next year.

REV. EDWARD BELL, of Nashwaak, N. B., will preach in Grace Church to-morrow at the evening service.

HEARTZ'S HALL.—Rev. Mr. Ross, of New Brunswick, will preach at Hertz's Hall to-morrow afternoon at three o'clock.

MARITIME COLT STAKES.—The Maritime Colt Stakes meeting will take place on the Amherst Driving Park on August 18 and 19. Councillor Hughes, of Charlottetown, and Mr. James McLeod, of Summerside, have horses entered.

RACING AT SUMMERSIDE.—There will be a horse race on Summerside Driving Park under the old management early in August. The events will be a :30 class, a three minute class, and one other class, of which due notice will be given. There will also be a bicycle race if a sufficient number of entries will be made to justify adding this feature.

RUDYARD KIPLING.—A Roman Patrician named John being a minished together with his wife by the virgin to build to her a church in Rome under the title of "Our Lady of the Snows" in the spot where on a certain night in the month of August snows would cover the ground. The miracle announced beforehand filled every one with wonder and not only was the church dedicated to Our Lady of the Snows, but many others throughout the world. Kipling's knowledge of this made him christen Canada "Our Lady of the Snows."

GREAT HAMMER THROWING.—At San Francisco, recently Tom Carroll, a local athlete, broke several hammer-throwing records in an exhibition. Starting with the eight pound hammer, he threw from a nine foot circle with one hand 241 feet 10 1/4 inches. He then threw a sixteen pound hammer from the seven foot circle 159 feet 3 1/2 inches, and from a nine foot circle hurled it 153 feet 11 inches. His next effort was with the 21 pound hammer: From a seven foot circle he threw it 112 feet, 1 1/2 inches; from a nine foot circle he created a record of 121 feet 10 inches.

ACCIDENT AT SUMMERSIDE.—The Guardian correspondent says: What might have been a much more serious accident happened at the railway crossing near the station here yesterday evening. Mr. J. E. Lefurgey and Miss Lefurgey of Summerside, and Mrs. McSweeney and three children of Moncton, were driving up the railway wharf, when about crossing the track a car which had been standing near the crossing was struck by a string of cars that were being shunted, and was driven into the carriage, overturning it and throwing the occupants out. Fortunately no one was hurt, although the carriage was badly damaged, two of the wheels being broken and the axles split.

THE HORSE TRADE.—There is a great demand for horses for export and the right kind of animals bring good prices, sales having been made of same at country points at from \$90 to \$125, which early last winter could have been bought at \$40 to \$60, owners then being free sellers at this range; but even at such low rates for sound stock, embracing heavy workers and good roadsters, it was difficult to effect sales. Things, however, are now very much changed as buyers are running through the country willing to pay the above advanced values for animals that are free from blemishes. The present demand is due chiefly to the European enquiry.—Montreal Bulletin.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

THE TEMPERATURE.—Seventy-seven in the shade to-day; seventy-eight yesterday.

THE WEATHER.—Fresh southerly winds, mostly cloudy with showers or thunder storms.

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH.—The Rev. H. C. Alywin, rector of Kensington, will take the morning and evening services at St. Paul's Church tomorrow.

FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.—Rev. Geo. Ross, of New Brunswick, will occupy the pulpit of the First Methodist Church to-morrow morning, and the pastor at night.

THE CHEESE INDUSTRY.—In ten days Mr. T. J. Dillon paid \$24,132 to the farmers for cheese. This cheese has all been shipped to London, England.

OPERA HOUSE.—The next attraction will be the Miles Ideal Stock Company which will open a week's engagement at the Opera House on the 28th August next. The company comes highly recommended.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon Lemuel McGregor and Patrick McMahon were each fined \$2 or 10 days for drunkenness. For a similar offence Obadiah Turbull was fined \$4 or 20 days. The assault case of Huestis vs. R. Steele was adjourned until Monday.

CHILLED WHILE SWIMMING.—Mr. Geo. D. Davison, of this city, went in swimming off the Park last evening. Shortly after going into the water, he became "chilled" and experienced considerable difficulty in getting ashore. Dr. Warburton was called in. To-day, it is pleasing to hear, Mr. Davison is about as usual.

A Pennsylvania doctor not long ago gave himself and patient a painful surprise. He had prescribed some medicine, and in doing so cautioned the patient to take only the amount indicated, as an overdose might result fatally. The man objected to using a poisonous drug in any kind of a dose, but the physician assured him that the quantity prescribed would not only be harmless, but beneficial in its effects. To carry conviction with his words, he took the bottle, poured out the quantity he had prescribed and took it himself. In a few minutes he was writhing on the floor, and it was only by the use of a stomach pump and antidotes that he escaped with his life. The patient did not take the medicine, and now that he has recovered is a convert to the idea that physic had better be thrown to the dogs.
