ISLANDER IN ENGLAND.

Sergt. Hessian, Invalided to England. Writes.

A letter has been received by Mrs. Simon Bolger, of this city, from her nephew Edmund Hessian who was with the first contingent in South Africa, having joined it at Quebec. He belongs to Georgetown. In part the letter runs:

SHORNCLIFFE, June 24th

I can at last write you and give you an idea of how I have moved about since I left Africa. I think I wrote you from Bloemfontein shortly before I became ill and was transferred to the general Hospital there. Here I remained six weeks and was then sent to Wynberg Hospital where I stayed two weeks. Next I was invalided to England and left Cape Town on the Orotara, arriving at Southampton on June 10th, after a pleasant trip of seventeen days. While on the way we had a fine view of the Spanish, Portuguese and French coasts. Our ship called at Sas Palmas, Canaries, for coal.

From Southampton we were taken to Netley Hospital, one of the finest in the world, with a length slightly over a quarter of a mile. We remained at Netley till yesterday, when we came to this place, which is a great summer resort. The quarters here are very comfortable. While on the way to Shorncliffe we stopped a while in London, having received permission. I was highly pleased with the city. We were entertained by Lord Strathcona, who sent one of his staff with us to see Westminster Abbey, the Crystal Palace, St. Paul's and the Tower. I am going to revisit London at the end of June, to stay two months. I shall not likely be home till Christmas.

The English people are treating us well and will not let us pass unnoticed. This afternoon we go to Sandgate on the invitation of a Canadian lady. We do not know who she is yet.

I have not received any mail for two months, and it is probably flying everywhere over South Africa.

ROBERTS AGAIN.

He Praises the Valour of Canadian Troops.

The Governor General has caused to be published the following despatch received from Lord Roberts:

"PRETORIA, July 6.—I have much pleasure in bringing to your Excellency's notice the good work done by the First and Second Battalions, Canadian Mounted Rifles, who have been repeatedly conspicuous for their gallant conduct and soldier-like instincts. During the attack by the Boers on Katbosch on the 22nd of June a small party of Pincher Creek men of the Second Battalion displayed the greatest gallantry and devotion to duty, holding in check a force of Boers by whom they were largely outnumbered. Corporal Mordean and Private Kerr continued fighting till mortally wounded. Lance Corporal Miles and Private Miles, wounded, continued to fire and hold their ground.

"On the 18th of June a party of the First Battalion, under Lieutenant Young, when operating with a force under General Hutton, to the northwest of Pretoria, succeeded in capturing two of the enemy's guns and brought in a herd of cattle and several prisoners without losing a man."

Japan and China.

PARIS, July 12.—The correspondent of the Mail and Empire has high Japanese authority for stating that Japan never sought a mandate to go ahead in China. On the contrary, that country was anxious to avoid any such mandate, owing to a lack of funds sufficient for the purpose. This authority added the situation was far different from the previous war. China is now strongly armed and prepared to fight, and the restoration of order will prove a most difficult and costly task, far exceeding Japan's resources. English diplomacy has departed from its traditional reserve in putting forward Japan as the European mandatory, without previously requesting Japan's consent.
