# DEATH OF FORMER WURTEMBERG KING.

**STUTTGART, Germany, Oct. 4.**—Former King William II of Wurttemberg is dead.

King William had suffered from a severe form of bronchitis, and his death was due to that and heart complications.

William II, reigning king of the monarchy of Wurttemberg, abdicated in November, 1918. He issued a proclamation, saying that his person would never serve to hinder the development of the wishes of the people. His abdication, along with that of many other German rulers, was a direct outcome of the war. He had reigned since 1891.
