Courtesy Parking Dan Cheated By Chisellers

Constable Allan Macleod who was delegated by city Police Chief Dennis Webster to handle the Board of Trade "courtesy nickel plan" for the benefit of Christmas shoppers has found that there are chisellers abusing the free meter service.

The plan is primarily for rural shoppers who come to town, enabling them to park and shop without worrying about parking tickets.

However, the police have noted the increasing number of motorists who normally leave their cars at home or park somewhere away from the centre of traffic are now bringing them to the heart of the city and taking up parking spaces which, it is felt, should be kept free for visiting shoppers. Particularly it is noted that even those who use their cars daily in any event are not putting any money in the meter.

Police officers have said the system in vogue for the Christmas season is not free parking for everyone, simply courtesy parking for those who wish to come to the city and enjoy the convenience of shopping without parking worries. And the feeling is growing that too many "chisellers" are grabbing the spaces meant for shoppers.

9-Unit Motel Is Underway

Canadian Rifle Trophy Won By St. Dunstons Cadets

"Time For Action" Says Town Planner

In the second phase of his study on town planning, Walter de Silva said that the major problems regarding housing development have arisen, mainly due to dormant zoning laws.

He said that the condition will last for some time.

The adoption of a minimum standard procedure, zoning plans, subdivision plans, and sensible building permit regulations, have been suggested to prevent poor planning and housing on Prince Edward Island.

He said this is "the opportune time" to take steps to prevent poor housing and poor planning from taking place.

SAID INADVERTENT

He also suggested that the present regulation which stipulates that a minimum of one mile of incorporated municipalities be incorporated into the provincial government.

He said moves because a great house building has taken place outside metropolitan Charlottetown and metropolitan Summerside, blight is only spotty in most communities.

He said, however, "promblematic shack houses have sprung up" along the Western Road in Prince County and in the areas surrounding Tignish and Montague.
