

### Is Absolved Of All Blame In Death Of Child

A verdict absolving Wilbert Dennis of any blame in the death of Cecil Norman MacDonald, O'Leary, was brought in by a coroner's jury at an inquest held last night in the O'Leary public hall with coroner Dr. Charles Dewar presiding.

The nine-year-old boy, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Grover MacDonald, died of injuries received May 17, when he was run over by a heavily loaded farm wagon, hauled by a tractor operated by Wilbert Dennis of Knutsford.

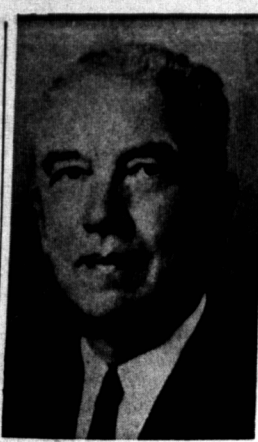
The first witness, Mrs. Edsel Dumville, O'Leary, told of witnessing the accident from a window of her home. She said the farm tractor, hauling a trailer and two farm wagons, was not going very fast at the time and a number of children were jumping on and off the wagons.

Arnold Wood and his son Colston also witnessed the accident from a truck a short distance behind the tractor. Both thought the driver would be unable to see the children on the wagons owing to the high rack on the trailer.

Wilbert Dennis, driver of the tractor, stated he warned the children to keep away and to stay off the wagons. He said he did not know they were on the wagon when he left the car where he had loaded eight tons of fertilizer on the trailer and two wagons.

His tractor was rated at between three and four miles per hour in the gear he was using to haul the loads. He stated he was not aware of the fatality until informed by two friends later in the evening.

### Breaking, Entering And Theft Case Opens At Summerside

The trial of Patrick Victor MacInnis of Borden, charged with breaking entry and theft from the Retail Vendor Store at Borden on the night of February 19th last, began in Supreme Court, Summerside yesterday after the swearing in of the petit jury, and was adjourned until this morning at 10:30 at the conclusion of the case for the Crown. Mr. Justice G.J. Tweedy is presiding judge. Mr. D. O. Stewart Q.C. and Neil R. MacLeod are representing the Crown and Mr. J. Harold Goodwin is attorney for the defence.

at the vendor store told the court the accused had purchased 2 pints of rum during the afternoon previous to the break and came in again near closing time, 5:30 p.m., and bought a quart of wine. Mr. Dawson told of being called to the store around 8:00 a.m. by Const. Robert Williams, who was a member of the Borden Detachment RCMP at the time of the break. He told of finding the padlock broken that secured the outside door to the main entrance and a panel on the inside door smashed. He also stated that one of the large panes of glass in the front window was broken and that there were stains that appeared to be dry blood both inside and outside the store.

During his testimony, Cpl. MacKinnon, who headed the investigation, said that reddish stains on the snow led from the vendor store to the home of the accused, but that he found no cuts on any part of the accused's body when he examined him later that day after he was picked up for questioning. He also told of taking the overshoes the accused was wearing and comparing the tread pattern with the footprints in the snow which he said were similar in appearance.

**TALKED TO ACCUSED**  
Mrs. McCormick said the accused came to her house around 12:45 a.m. in the early morning of Feb. 20th and he asked her if she'd like to buy a couple of pints of liquor, which according to her evidence, she told him she didn't want. Mrs. McCormick said the accused mentioned that a couple

of fellows had broken into the liquor store but said she couldn't remember whether he told her a thousand dollars or a thousand bottles had been stolen. She said MacInnis asked to use the phone to call a taxi, and that she noticed blood on the end of his right hand index finger. She said he wasn't drunk or wasn't sober and was wearing two pairs of pants. Mrs. McCormick said the accused told her the blood was the result of his having fallen on the railroad tracks.

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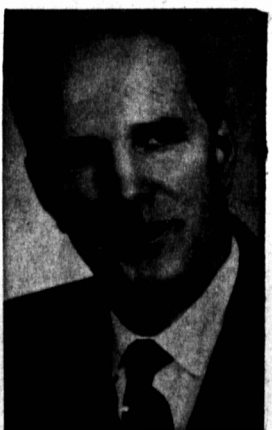
