

Cattle Trade.

In order to benefit by this business our farmers must improve their stock. They need have no uneasiness about a market. So soon as stock raising becomes a leading feature in the products of the country there will be plenty of buyers, and steamers are certain to call at our shipping ports to seek for the freight. We wonder that our people have not kept pace with their neighbors in this particular. Many years ago Judge Peters gave our farmers a new departure in the matter of cultivating turnips, and to him more than any other cause are we indebted for the splendid turnip fields to be found on so many farms in the autumn. The people thoroughly believe in the Judge. If he could be again induced to give a few lectures on the subject of improving our exports, in two or three of the leading centres of agriculture on the Island he would accomplish more for the benefit of the Province in this connection than any other means that we know of.—*Summerside Progress.*

English Election Matters.

Cable despatches to the New York Tribune state Mr. Gladstone is awakening great enthusiasm in Scotland. His speeches are regarded as sounding the key-note of the campaign. The Liberals have nominated his son, Herbert, for Middlesex, and agreed to pay his election expenses, about \$50,000. The Irish voters are disposed to support British towns. Parnell's friends will endeavor to induce him to acquiesce in this programme. Sir S. Northcote's assurance that Parliament would not be asked to give a dowry for the Princess Frederica of Hanover, is explained by the announcement that it is intended to provide her husband with a sinecure office, a proposition that will be quite as distasteful to the British elector as the other.

The Austrian Government it would seem is greatly offended at Mr. Gladstone's attack on the policy of that country. A Vienna correspondent reports that the Emperor of Austria had told Sir Henry Elliott, British Ambassador at Vienna, that Mr. Gladstone disapproved of Austria's foreign policy and the Emperor hoped that Lord Beaconsfield would be successful in the coming election. Mr. Gladstone, after repeating this statement, said if the electors approved of Austria's foreign policy he would advise them to vote for the retention of Beaconsfield's ministry. Austria, he said, has ever been the unflinching enemy of freedom in every country in Europe, and there is not a spot on the whole map where one could place his finger and say: "There Austria did good." This statement may be unpalatable to Austria, but it is unfortunately only too true.

The Earl of Perth.

THE ADVENTURES OF A SCOTCH LORD.

George Essex Montifex, Lord Drummond's grandson and heir of the present Earl of Perth has gone back to Scotland. Seven or eight years ago, he married his grandmother's maid, a buxom girl, several years older than himself, and ran away with her to this country. He landed in New York without means and hired himself as a shipping clerk to a down town firm. He was wayward, and by his own foolishness got out of his position. He left the city and settled at Brook Haven, a fishing village on the south shore of Long Island. He lived there in a picturesque old farm-house, supporting himself and his wife very comfortably by fishing and shooting. He remained in Brook Haven for several years. He lost utterly all his English characteristics, and in appearance, manners and language was like the fishermen who surrounded him. He had little education and no taste for reading, and he seemed both contented with and fitted for the life which he led. He was tall and athletic and might be seen any summer's evening, after fishing hours, slouching about his door, wearing a blue flannel shirt, a huge pair of rubber boots and a battered old sou'wester. His neighbors knew him as George, and the younger generation found in him a boon companion. About two years ago a son and heir was born to him. Last year he quitted his fishing, and bringing his wife and child to the city, hired himself out as porter to a dry goods house. The wife of the young Lord is passably good looking. She is substantial in person and looks as if she enjoyed good health; she also is uneducated, but she has read to an extent and is considerably more intelligent than his Lordship. She talks cockney English and takes the widest liberties with the letter H. The animal health of the parents seems to have descended to the child. When the young Lord was a shipping clerk in the city he was visited by Lord Walter Campbell, son of the Duke of Argyll and brother of the Marquis of Lorne, and who was a member of a New York business house at the time, and who unsuccessfully tried to persuade the runaway to give up his wife and return to his people. It is understood a reconciliation has been effected between the old Earl and his grandson.

I think, says a traveller, I saw the funniest inscription in America in the old cemetery at Upper Sandusky, O. It is neatly and plainly cut in the marble slab as follows: "Christiana, wife of John Haag, Died February 21, 1869." How such a blunder ever got into the copy, or how even the stone cutter could let it go on is a mystery. I believe it is the only recorded instance of a death occurring on that date.

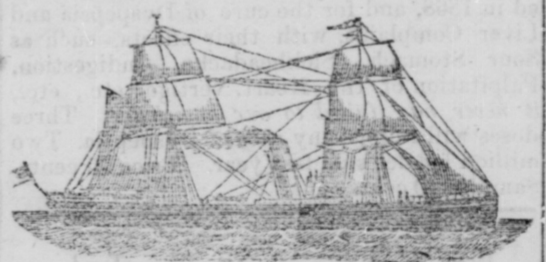
