## Farewell Dinner To Mr. J. W. Dixon

A farewell dinner was held at the Queen Hotel on Monday evening, October 27th in honour of Mr. J. W. Dixon, C. A., the local director-Taxation who has been promoted to the position of Director-Taxation at Fort Williams.

The dinner was attended by the staff of the local Income Tax Office, former members of the staff, their wives and guests. Mr. J. L. Clark was Master of Ceremonies.

Farewell gifts were presented on behalf of the staff to Mr. and Mrs. Dixon. The address was read by Mr. J. P. Campbell.

Mr. Dixon, in his reply, paid tribute to the co-operation he had received from all members of the staff during his fifteen years in the local office and expressed his regret that his promotion made it necessary for him and his family to move to another province.

After the dinner, the evening was passed with entertainment by various members of the staff, a sing-song and dancing led by Mr. P. E. Blanchard.

Following is the text of the address presented to Mr. Dixon by the staff.

"Mr. J. Wellington Dixon. Parkdale, P. E. I. Dear Mr. Dixon:

"In the past few years there have been a great many changes in the Taxation Division but the announcement that you had been appointed Director at Fort William

was one of that caught us un-awares.

It is now almost two weeks since the news broke, and our viewpoint has, in the interval, become considerably broadened, as indeed our first reaction was that we can not do this to us. There must have been some reason behind the event as such things do not happen by chance.

"Looking back over the years since you were appointed Director of this office there have been many highlights. There was the period when all were striving to cope with the backlog of work that had accumulated when manpower was not available. There was then the period of adjustment in staff when the work had been brought to a current basis. In this period, when staff was being reduced to about one-half of its peak, it may be said that by your human interest and advice separations were carried out with the minimum of discomfort to those concerned. Indeed, through experience with the Taxation Division, most were able to secure employment with local concerns to mutual advantage. Many more such highlights might be cited but Section 121 of the Income Tax Act forces us to be silent.

"We all realize that a promotion, unthought, such as yours, will serve to show that your ability and devotion to duty have not gone unnoticed by your superiors.

"You possess talents which might well be developed by any who seek promotion. As a boy on the farm you have learned well the value of hard work and self reliance. In your school period, which has not stopped, you have demonstrated that things worth while do not come by taking your ease. You, in this period, also learned teamwork and a spirit of co-operation in football and other athletics. Somewhere along the line you have cultivated the art of deep thought, an art which unfortunately appears to be less undervalued by many in our time, and are able to examine events in a broad perspective and arrive at a sound solution.

"The community in which you at all times took an interest suffers a distinct loss. Some years ago you took a very active interest in Scouting, this was followed later by Army Cadets. You have been Chairman of School Unit No. 1 since its inception, and have devoted much time to community betterment. We know that you will find other worthy projects calling for attention in your new sur-
