

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

THE CASE DISMISSED.—The charge of violating the Canada Temperance Act preferred against Lauchlin McCallum was dismissed yesterday afternoon. IMPROVEMENTS.—The fence around King Square is receiving some little attention, and Kent Street, at the junction of Hillsborough, is being macadamized. THE EREMA ARRIVES.—By cable to Penke Bros. & Co. we learn that the barkentine Erema, A. Neilson, master, arrived at Queenstown, G. B., on the 10th inst., 21 days from this port. THE POLINO.—The steamer Polino arrived from Montreal last evening with a good cargo of cargo, and leaves this evening for St. John's via Sydney, with a cargo of oats, pork, etc., and a deckload of fat cattle shipped by B. Henderson. FIRE.—The alarm at noon today was for a slight blaze on the roof of a house on Hillsborough Street, near Parson's forge. HORSE MARKET.—Late advices from Boston report that the horse market is very flat just now, and prices obtained are far from satisfactory. Several good Canadian animals have been offered at the stables, but the buyers have the advantage as every day seemed to be bargain day in this line. A NEW DEVICE for shutting cars on side tracks of railways has been patented by Mr. Edwin McLeven, of O'Leary Station, P. E. Island. This will do away with the danger of jolting cars along the side tracks which has caused so many accidents to railways. It is attached to the engine and moves cars forward or backward without danger. Y. M. C. A.—At the convention at St. Stephen, on Saturday, various reports and papers were disposed of. Messrs. D. Gordon, of Summerside, and W. C. Turner, and S. C. Moore, of Charlottetown, were appointed members of the Maritime Committee for the coming year. Mr. J. S. Raymond was one of those who took part in a most interesting discussion on boys' work. THE COBLENZ CASE.—An exchange says: It is now announced that prosecutor Holtzman of Indianapolis, Ind., is determined to thoroughly investigate the circumstances of the marriage of Charles Coghlan to the woman who is alleged to have been his wife previously to his marrying Kuehne Beverage. It is said that the relatives and friends of Miss Beveridge are urging him to take steps in the matter, and have agreed to pay any expenses that may be incurred in getting the record of a first marriage in England. An agent will soon visit Prince Edward Island to secure evidence of importance in that quarter. DISTINGUISHED VISITORS.—During the past week Montreal was visited by three eminent men—Lord Mount Stephen, Field Marshal Sir Donald Stewart, and Major General Sir John McNeill. The latter visited this Island with the late Sir John Young prior to Confederation, and subsequently visited Canada in capacity of the Princess Louise and the Duke of Connaught. Sir Donald Stewart received his appointment as Field Marshal on the Queen's Birthday honors of the 24th of May last. Lord Mount Stephen, who looks on Canada as his home, will remain for some months. The distinguished party, with friends, will fish salmon on the Metepedia, and may probably visit the blind side of the Province during their stay in Canada. CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

A Batch of Communications Disposed of in One Way or Another. THERE was a full attendance of members at the regular meeting of the City Council held last evening. After routine business, Councillor Fenell reported that plans and specifications had been made for improving the sanitary condition of the Market House and City Building, but no tenders for the work had yet been accepted. Mayor Dawson informed the Board that he had wired Mr. L. H. Davies and Senator Ferguson requesting them to interview the Minister of Public Works, asking him to allow the city to connect a sewer from the Market House with the Post Office sewer, and had received a reply from the former saying that the matter was under the consideration of the Minister, and the request would probably be granted. He had also written both these gentlemen on the subject, and expected an answer by to-morrow evening's mail. The report of Councillor Fenell was laid over pending the answer. Councillor Hughes reported that Thos. Desmond and Thos. Mills had been appointed city scavengers, and gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would introduce a bylaw defining the duties of these scavengers and other matters in connection therewith. A bill of Charles McGregor for making plans and specifications for repairs to Queen's Wharf, was referred to the Finance Committee. A letter from Artemas Carr, asking compensation for injuries sustained by his wife on the 20th ult., which injuries, he claimed, were caused by a defective sidewalk, was referred to the Street Committee. A letter from Rev. Wm. Hamlyn, supporting Mr. Carr's claim, and suggesting compensation, was also read. A letter was read from Rev. Wm. Scott, renewing the application made by himself and Mr. Geo. H. Foster upwards of a year ago regarding the erection of a sewer in the vicinity of his premises on Beaufort Street, in order that the drainage might be improved. He related the number of cases of fever that had occurred in his family recently, and expressed the hope that the Board would grant his request. Dr. McLeod also wrote the Board, explaining that owing to bad drainage the premises of Rev. Mr. Scott had been infected with fever, as well as his wife, as for several years past, and stating that nothing but suitable drainage would do away with this infection. The matter was discussed at some length, but no action was taken. A letter was read from Captain Ronald McMillan, asking permission to run a railway track across Prince Street, about fifteen feet south of present crossing, to connect railway yard with his wharf, he to make good crossings at the track and satisfactory gradings at the landing. Councillor Tanton moved that the matter be referred to the Public Property Committee, said committee to have power to grant the request if considered advisable after consultation with Mr. McMillan and the Recorder. Councillor Fenell moved in amendment that the matter be referred to the Mayor and Street Committee, to be dealt with as they see fit. The amendment carried. A bill of \$10.05 from McLeod, Morson & McQuarrie, for services rendered some time ago in connection with a seizure, was referred to the Finance Committee and the Recorder. A letter from Philip Coye, asking compensation for certain land expropriated by the city, was referred to the Street Committee and the Recorder. A petition from certain residents of Richmond and West Streets, asking that these two streets be connected by a roadway, was referred to a special committee composed of Councillors Taylor, Douse and Fenell, to ascertain cost of roadway and sewer, and report at next meeting. Councillor Taylor moved that the City Surveyor be instructed to put down a plankway on the east side of Hillsborough Street, between Mark Wright's showroom and Parson's forge. Councillor Fenell moved in amendment that the matter be left in the hands of the Street Committee. The amendment carried. A request from William G. Mugford, asking permission to operate a photograph salon on Market Square, was not granted. Councillor Taylor gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would move that \$10 a month be granted John McCort, an odd and true servant of the city who has been laid aside for some time past owing to illness, said grant to continue until he is able to resume work. A letter was read from John P. Joy asking for a license to operate a billiard hall on Water Street, near the Queen Hotel. The clerk was instructed to write Mr. Joy, referring him to the by-law in such cases made and provided. A petition from a number of citizens asking for amendments to the by-law regarding sign-boards, posts, etc., was also read. No action taken. A letter was read from W. S. Stewart, stating that if the award in the case of the place of business of ex-Councillor Morrison on Lower Queen Street, was removed, as threatened, the city would be held responsible. Mayor Dawson said the City Surveyor had told him that everyone had complied with the law in this respect except Mr. Morrison. His Worship also called attention to certain other encroachments on the street in the shape of fences. Coun. Hooper, according to notice given at last regular meeting, moved that the sum of \$100 be granted the Provincial Rifle Association. Coun. Douse moved in amendment that the Recorder give a written opinion regarding the legality of this grant at next meeting. A good deal of discussion followed, after which Coun. Douse's amendment was put and lost and the main motion carried. Mayor Dawson said he would not sign a check for amount until he had the recorder's opinion on the subject. Coun. Hazard said there was no report to submit in the Bolger case. After some discussion regarding obstructions on the streets, the council adjourned sine die. MARKET.—The market to-day was fairly well attended, and the supply a little above the average. Butter, fresh, has dropped to from 17c to 20c; eggs sold at from 8c to 9c per doz; fowl at 50c to 55c per pair; hay at from 65c to 75c per cwt; oats at 40c per bush; lobsters at 2c to 10c each; mackerel at 5c to 12c each; codfish, fresh, at 10c to 15c each.
