

PERISHED IN THE STORM.

JAMES CAMPBELL AND HIS SISTER-IN-LAW—MISS McLEAN—PERISH IN FRIDAY'S STORM—MR. CAMPBELL'S SON SERIOUSLY FROZEN.

The suffering endured by these unfortunate people who were of necessity compelled to return from the city to their homes during Friday's storm was terrible. From all sections of the country came news of dreadful experience, narrow escapes, and unprecedented hardships undergone by country travellers. Among the most terrible which comes to notice is that of Mr. James Campbell and his sister-in-law—Miss McLean—who, on Friday night last perished at Goose Creek, West River, on the way to their home at Big Point, South Shore. They, in company with Mr. Campbell's son, a boy about seventeen years of age, left this city at four o'clock, for their home. They crossed on the track which leads from "Cut Street." On the ice they endured all the fury of the pitiless storm. Their horses, plunging through the deep snow, became exhausted on reaching Goose Creek. Here the darkness of the night and fury of the storm prevented them from proceeding further with teams or on foot. The boy, who had been driving a team in the rear, saw a light a short distance from the Creek. He left his team, and on reaching the house, four hundred yards distant—a feat which he accomplished after two hours of battling with the storm—found it to be that of Mr. Lane. The time he arrived was five o'clock on Saturday morning. He procured the assistance of Mr. Lane, and his neighbors, Messrs. Dowell and McNeill, and proceeded to the Creek. The storm was still raging furiously, and it was by undergoing a very difficult search that the horses were found, as they were well up the Creek. On reaching them a terrible sight might be viewed. The horses, exhausted were still standing, while the dead body of the unfortunate man Campbell was sitting erect in the sleigh. His hand's still held the reins. To all appearance he was asleep, but on approaching they found he was frozen to death. By his side on the sleigh lay the dead, frozen body of his sister-in-law. The bodies were immediately removed to the nearest house, and were forwarded to-day to Big Point. The boy Campbell suffered much from exposure. His feet, hands and face were seriously frozen; but Dr. Beer, who prescribed for him, cannot tell the extent of his injury. The deceased Mr. Campbell was a well-to-do farmer. The greatest sympathy is expressed for his family.

TERRIBLE CASE OF SUICIDE.

An Insane Woman Hangs Herself at the Asylum.

CORONER McLEOD HOLDS AN INQUEST.

A woman patient at Falconwood Asylum killed herself on Saturday night. She was a very violent lunatic, and was consequently handcuffed and confined in a bare room, containing nothing but her bed. She had a habit of gnawing the sashes of the window of her room; and, to prevent her continuing to do so, a shutter was provided. This shutter was in two parts, a lower and an upper. The upper part was so arranged that it would slide up and down, so that the light might be admitted as required. The unfortunate woman, handcuffed as she was, dragged her bed to the wall under the window, reached the upper part of the shutter, drew it down to within a few inches of the lower part, inserted her head between the two, kicked away the bed, and let her body hang. These are, in brief, the particulars, as we have been informed of them.

Coroner McLeod is now engaged in holding an inquest, the evidence given at which will appear to-morrow.

The name of the unfortunate woman is Johanna Brien (or O'Brien). We are informed that her husband, with several children (six, it is said,) reside in the eastern part of the Province.

MORE BAD NEWS.

Solomon Dockendorff Perishes in the Storm.

HE LEAVES A LARGE AND HELPLESS FAMILY.

Rev. Mr. McDonald, of this city, received the following telegram from R. Burdett, Esq., of Dundas:

"CARDIGAN, Feb. 13.

"Solomon Dockendorff perished in the storm of Friday evening last. His body was found on Saturday."

The deceased was a son of Mr. Jacob Dockendorff, of North River. He leaves a large and helpless family.

Oh! it gets ahead of me.

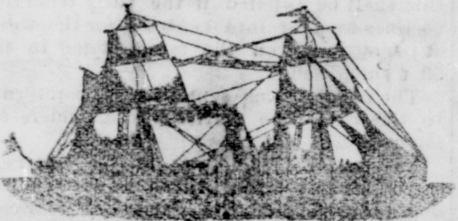

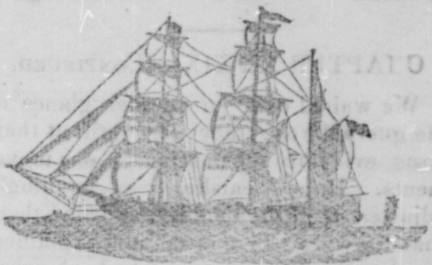
