Reds Beat Philadelphia; Mets Continue Losing

CINCINNATI (AP)—Jim Maloney and Don Nottbart combined for a five-hitter as Cincinnati Reds beat Philadelphia 4-2 Sunday. Reds swept the four-game series from the Phils and extended their winning streak to five games.

The Reds batted around in the first inning as they jumped on Larry Jackson for three runs. Pete Rose walked, went to third on Tommy Helms' single and scored on Deron Johnson's sacrifice fly. Two more runs scored on singles by Art Shamsky and Leo Cardenas.

ATLANTA (AP)—Homers by Ed Mathews and Rico Carty delivered three runs and New York errors accounted for three more as Atlanta Braves extended the Mets' losing streak to five games Sunday with an 8-4 victory.

Mathews hit a bases-empty homer off Met starter Dennis Ribant in the first inning and Carty drilled a two-run shot in the seventh against reliever Jack Hamilton.

Decision By Thant Scheduled

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—U Thant is to disclose Thursday a decision that can influence for years the course of events in the United Nations and much of the world.

The unassuming Burmese will send a letter to the 117 member nations saying whether he will take a second term as UN secretary-general. His current five-year term ends Nov. 3.

Some among the diplomats, officials and correspondents at this headquarters are predicting Thant will bow out. Many believe he finally will agree to stay 1 1/2 or two years.

Thant is 57 and is eligible to retire on pension at \$13,750 a year. As secretary-general he gets a car and \$65,000 a year in salary and allowances.

Nfld. Ferry Makes Trip

HALIFAX (CP) — The CNR ferry William Carson arrived at Port aux Basques, Nfld., at 11:15 p.m. NDT Sunday and a CNR spokesman said she would leave at 2:00 a.m. NDT for the return trip to North Sydney, N.S.

The spokesman said there were "just a few pickets" to greet the ferry, which disembarked 422 passengers and 110 cars and began taking aboard 430 passengers and 115 cars for the return 175-mile voyage across the Cabot Strait.

The spokesman said pickets did not create any trouble when the William Carson arrived. He did not expect any for the departure.

The Carson's arrival and planned departure appeared to have ended some disagreement between the unions and CNR officials to keep the service in operation in the wake of the national rail strike that began Friday.

Parents Of Two Injured Boys Demand CNE Probe Case

TORONTO (CP) — The parents of two boys seriously hurt Saturday when a spinning Canadian National Exhibition midway ride collapsed, injuring 21 persons, have demanded a full investigation.

"I feel it's awful there should be a ride like this," said Mrs. John Ellis of Toronto. "Our sons may be injured for years to come." John Ellis, 13, is in hospital with a fractured spine and his brother, Gary, 11, has serious abdominal injuries. Another boy, John Dimichele, 10, of Toronto, has serious back injuries.

The accident was the first major mishap of its kind in the CNE's 88-year history.

The ride, called the Trabant, is operated by Patty Conklin Shows which leases it from William McMurrey of Riverside, Calif. It consists of a ring of seats which revolve on a platform. The platform is raised by a hydraulic apparatus which rotates it at a 40-degree angle.

Ten persons were treated at the exhibition hospital and released. Eight others were taken to two Toronto hospitals and all were released except Bonnie Crawford of Kitchener, Ont., who will be operated on today for a cut hand.

A spokesman for Conklin Shows said Sunday it is believed a mechanical failure in the ride's hydraulic system caused the collapse.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jim King's two-out single in the ninth inning scored Willie Kirkland, giving Washington Senators a 3-2 victory over Cleveland Sunday and extending their winning string to five games.

Kirkland, pinch hitting for reliever Ron Kline, walked with one out in the ninth, took second on Bob Saverine's infield hit and scored on King's single to center field Luis Tiant.

Dick Howser, whose leadoff homer in the eighth gave the Indians a 2-1 lead, Fred Valentine's grounder in the top of the inning, enabling the Senators to tie it at 2-2.

NEW YORK (AP) — Rookie Steve Whitaker hit a grand slam homer and rookie Fritz Peterson fired a five-hitter as New York Yankees whipped Detroit 8-1 Sunday, completing a three-game series sweep over Tigers.

Whitaker, who came up from the minors last Monday, hit his third homer in three games after singles by Horace Clarke and Bobby Richardson and an intentional walk to Tom Tresh loaded the bases in the fifth.

Joe Pepitone's 30th homer, a two-run shot in the third, had given Peterson an early lead. The young left-hander blanked the Tigers until the eighth, when Norm Cash homered, and breezed to his 10th victory in 19 days.

BALTIMORE (AP) — Joe Foy singled home a run in the seventh inning, snapping a tie and sending Boston to a 3-2 victory over the American League-leading Baltimore Orioles Sunday.

With the game deadlocked 2-2, George Smith led off the Boston seventh with a double. He reached third on Darrell Brandon's bunt single and scored as Foy singled to center field.

The Red Sox picked up a run in the first inning when Jose Tartabull scored from third as Oriole catcher Vic Rosovsky threw to second trying to get Carl Yastrzemski, who had overrun second on Tony Conigliaro's single.

FACTS about your UNITED FUND

WHAT IS YOUR FAIR SHARE?

This is the final bulletin in the question-and-answer series concerning the United Fund. We have already discussed the need of a United Fund, the administration of the Fund, the member agencies and how an organization may become a member, and how your money is distributed.

This week we shall deal with the question: What is your fair share?

The answer to this question, of course, can be given only by yourself. But a "Fair Share" scale has been drawn up, which has been of use to donors in deciding just what amount they should give.

For workers paid by the hour — one hour's pay per month or twelve hours' pay per year.

For salaried workers — One per cent of gross income.

For farmers and fishermen — One per cent of average gross income over the last three years, or a minimum of \$10 paid at the time you receive your crop payment, catch payment, bonus or hold-back.

The Fair Share plan was established after a review of many similar plans in other communities. Everyone is urged to pledge, but it is not presumed to tell anyone the amount he should pledge. Experience has shown, however, that the Fair Share standards are seldom a burden and are becoming acceptable to more and more donors each year. This is the best evidence we have that such standards are reasonable.
