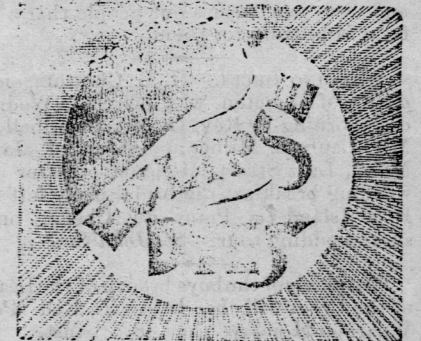

Ice Water - Doctors Disagree.

JAMAICA EXHIBITION, 1891.

AN EXHIBITION will be held in Kingston Jamaica, in January, 1891, of Island products, manufactures and works of art, with exhibits of works of art, machinery and industrial and agricultural products from Great Britain, other countries and colonies.

In view of the geographical relation of the island of Jamaica with the sea ports of Canada, and the nature and extent of the imports of Jamaica, as well as the products of the island, the Government of Canada accepted an invitation in such exhibition, with a view of obtaining an extension of markets for the products and manufactures of Canada.

The Canadian Government will undertake to pay freight of all approved exhibits. Entries must be made not later than September 20th next, and the latest date at which exhibits can be sent forward from Halifax, N. S., or St. John, N. B., is the middle of December.

Mr. Adam Brown, M. P., has been appointed Honorary Commissioner to represent Canada at the exhibition.

Forms of application and general information can be obtained on application to the Honorary Commissioner. Address Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, or to the undersigned.
