New Contrecoeur Mill Produces First Steel

CONTRECOEUR, Que. (CP) - The Contrecoeur mill of Dosco Steel Ltd. produced its first sheets of flat rolled steel last week, marking a new development in the Canadian steel industry.

The steel is the first to be produced by a new blast cleaning process is said to eliminate acid disposal and prevent water pollution.

It is a product of Dosco's new \$40,000,000 hot and cold rolling mills completed early this year in this community, 20 miles northeast of Montreal, on the south bank of the St. Lawrence River.

These mills, partially operating at present, are expected to be in full operation later this year, providing the company with an integrated steel operation for the Quebec market. The new facilities are adjacent to the company's rod and bar mill.

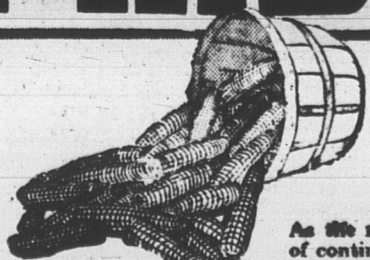

Dosco to build a flat steel rolling mill in Quebec in 1960. Dosco decided to go ahead with its own plans.

The company began phase one of the expansion in 1963. In December, 1964 the first production samples were produced from the rod and bar mills.

Easy access to rail and water transportation and close proximity to the Montreal market were factors deciding Dosco to locate the development at Contrecoeur, a village of about 2,000.

The company now has almost completed its \$60,000,000 current investment in facilities for the production of rod, bar and flat rolled products. Ultimate capacity of the bar and rod mill will be about 450,000 tons annually when the existing facilities are "twinned."

Legion May Fade Away To Huge Welfare Fund

By FRED HAMILTON MONTREAL (CP) - The Royal Canadian Legion, like the old soldiers it represents, will never die.

But it may, in the distant future, fade away into a multi-million dollar welfare fund whose profits will be used to perpetuate the principles the legion represents.

That is the apparent consensus among senior officers of the legion, which concluded its bi-annual national convention Friday.

Only one item of business during the week-long convention - a centennial fund, was conceived with what happens to the legion should there come a day when there are no more wars and no surviving veterans or their dependents.

The Legion still has pressing problems of far more immediate importance to occupy its debates, but the future is beginning to dominate its thinking. Outgoing President Fred T. O'Brecht and First Vice-President Robert Kohaly, made it obvious in interviews it isn't a

Mr. Kohaly, a 45-year-old lawyer from Estevan, Sask., who in the normal course of events can be expected to become Dominion president in 1968, agreed the centennial fund is the basis of legion planning for the future.

Mr. Kohaly thinks it is natural the legion's physical assets will in time, be turned over to the fund.

"That would make them available as a perpetual memorial to the war dead and to all veterans, and as a means of carrying on the principles of the legion."
