Pleads Guilty To Break At Curling Club

SUMMERSIDE — A 23-year-old Summerside man was remanded until this morning for sentence when he pleaded guilty to a break and entry charge before Magistrate R. S. Hinon, Q.C. in police court here Friday. The accused admitted breaking into the Summerside Curling Club early Friday morning. He was apprehended at the scene by Constables Berry, Champion and MacKinnon of the town force. The police officers went to the curling club in response to a call about 3.30 a.m. from a nearby resident who said he had heard glass breaking. The accused was found in the boiler room of the building. About a year ago the officers caught three Summerside men in the act of breaking into the club. Two residents of Albany pleading guilty to charges of being intoxicated in a public place each drew fines of \$20 and costs or 15 days.

A Tignish man pleaded not guilty to a similar charge and was remanded in custody until this morning.

Town Act Undergoing Face-Lifting

SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside Town Incorporation Act is currently being revised and will be presented to the legislature after it is completed and passed by the town council. D. O. Stewart, Q.C., town solicitor, is preparing the revision, the first since 1933, with the assistance of Town Manager J. A. Brophy. The act has never been revised or amalgamated although many amendments have been passed over the years, resulting in numerous duplications.

Frost Defends Moosonee Port

TORONTO (CP) — Premier Frost says the development of an ocean port at Moosonee on James Bay is aimed at "bringing the wealth of the Arctic down into Ontario." He said in an interview Thursday night that it has little to do with overseas shipments of Canadian products. He had no notion of trying to build up Moosonee as another export port, after the "disappointing experience" at Churchill, Man., he said. The premier said that with exploration and development in the Far North, especially in iron mining, the province would be "just plain crazy" if it didn't take advantage of the northern port and the rail line that runs up to it.
