ST. ANDREWS, N. B., July 10—Red-headed Pete Kelly, who plays in the National Hockey League in winter and spends his summers in Charlottetown, led the amateur field tonight at the end of 36 holes in the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island golf tournament. He is defending the championship.

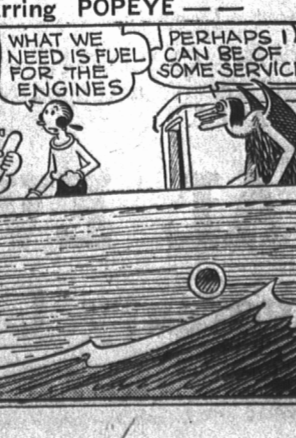
Col. Price, who won the D. S. O. and the D. C. M. with the 17th Duke of York's Hussars of Montreal, is not likely to do any shooting himself.

Gormley Trails Leaders By One Point For Best Canuck Score In Daily Mail Match

By EDWIN JOHNSON Canadian Press Staff Writer BISLEY CAMP, England, July 10—Canadian marksmen equalled the best scores in one feature match at Bisley today and shot well up in the other, as the Empire meeting of the National Rifle Association got under way.

The Canadians, Lieut. C.F. Kennedy of Hilden, N.S., and Corporal H. D. Whitehead of Toronto tied with 13 others for the lead in the Daily Telegraph match at 300 yards and will be in the tie shoot for the trophy Wednesday. Kennedy and Whitehead had scores of 49 out of a possible 50. A possible was registered in the Daily Telegraph but it was achieved by Quartermaster-Sergeant H. Creek, formerly of the Devonshire Regiment, shooting in the tyro class which is not eligible for the major awards.

The day's second feature, the Daily Mail match at 500 yards, resulted in a tie between two English marksmen. Pilot Officer R. Eastern of the Royal Air Force and Cpl. J. E. White of the London Rifle Brigade. These two had perfect scores of 50 and will shoot off for the trophy later.

Best Canadian score in the Daily Mail event was just a point short of possible, 49's being registered by Lieut. A. F. Gormley of Charlottetown and Company Sgt.-Major Harry Rusk of Ottawa. Whitehead, Kennedy, Capt. U. C. Lucas of Toronto and Sgt. J. G.

American Leaguers Rule Easy Favorite On Eve Of Annual "Dream" Game

By SID FEDER Associated Press Sports Writer AMERICAN LEAGUE NEW YORK, July 10 (AP)—Boasting an advantage in the pitcher's box and the American League All-Star Team ruled favorite tonight to trim the National Leaguers in the seventh annual edition of baseball's "dream" game at Yankee Stadium tomorrow.

Dominated by members of the two pennant favorites—New York Yankees and Gaby Hartnett, center fielder for the Yankees—hand-picked squads get the annual extravaganza of the diamond underway at 3 p. m. EDT, before a crowd of almost 50,000 fans.

The two managers, Joe McCarthy, boss of the World Champion New York Yankees, and Gabby Hartnett, pilot of the National League pennant-holding Chicago Cubs, announced a pair of lineups today that would give the Yankees a considerable edge in the pitching department.

Since the American Leaguers, for the first time, got into the All-Star tilt heading a pitching staff as well as batting order, Broadway betting commissioners tonight couldn't see the National Leaguers.

The Americans were quoted at 9 to 10 to walk off with their fifth victory in seven All-Star meetings with the senior circuit, while the Nationals were held at a good 8 to 1 price that caused a considerable showing of money for Ford Frick's loop to repeat their 1938 upset.

Only new change from the squads previously selected by the eight managers of each league found Cookie Lavaretto, Brooklyn's third baseman, out of contention with an ailing leg and Eddie Miller of Boston Bees taking his place with the National League force of 25 men. Harvey Scores Decision Win Over McAvoy

LONDON, July 10—Len Harvey, British and Empire light-heavyweight champion, won a 15-round decision over Jack McAvoy tonight in a bout billed for the world light-heavyweight championship.

After surviving a beating in the 13th round, Harvey caught McAvoy in his corner in the final round and beat him badly with a series of hard right crosses. The champion was wobbling in the 44th and only his big weight advantage enabled him to score so heavily in the 15th. Harvey weighed 175 pounds to McAvoy's 167.

The bout was designated as a world title affair after John Henry Lewis was refused permission to fight Harvey because of his failing eyesight and the British Boxing Board of Control decided it would no longer recognize Lewis as world champion.

After the championship bout, Eddie Phillips, 189 lb., knocked out Jack Doyle, 218 lb., in the Irish boxer-singer in the first round with a hard right cross to the jaw. Earlier in the round, Doyle knocked Phillips down for a count of one with a quick right hook and pushed him down a second time.

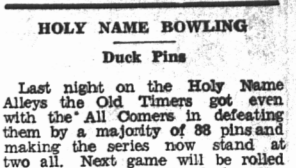
