QUEBEC (CP)—Horace Thifault, 68, charged with the attempted dynamite slaying of his grandson, held \$10,000 insurance policy on the boy, his preliminary hearing was told Monday.

An insurance company executive testified at the first day of the preliminary hearing that the policy's double indemnity clause provided \$20,000 if the boy, 13, died an accidental death.

The hearing was adjourned to Wednesday after defence counsel submitted there were no grounds for the case.

Thifault was charged following a dynamite explosion at a summer camp at Grand-Anse, 40 miles south of La Tuque, Jan. 26. Grandson Roland Bedard, the boy's mother, Jeanne d'Arc Bedard, and Octavien Massicotte, Thifault's lumber business partner, were slightly injured. All are from Shawinigan Falls.
