A CONFIDENT EXPECTATION Of Great Conservative Victory. Candidates Elected by Acclamation.

OTTAWA, June 17. Despatches from all over the Dominion show the confident expectation of a Conservative victory in every Province, and a larger Government majority than after the last election.

The grists are without candidates in three New Brunswick constituencies, and twenty-one in the other Provinces. The Conservatives have no candidates in six places. The candidates elected by acclamation are Dupont (Conservative), and Vallanournt (Liberal), and Beausoleil (Liberal), expected to support the Government. The others elected by acclamation are Bernier (Grit) and Rogers (Liberal).

MEETING AT MONTICELLO. Owing to the failure to materialize of the grit meeting called at Monticello on Tuesday and Friday last, the Conservatives agreed to allow their meeting, called for Monday, to be held at the Hon. Mr. Ferguson's, to be a joint one.

The grist took advantage of the courtesy shown them by gathering their decimated following from all points on the north side, and with the aid of a liberal supply of whiskey dispensed at the schoolhouse adjoining the Hall, made systematic efforts to prevent a fair discussion. These desperate and disreputable tactics did not, however, prevent the Conservative speakers from getting a good hearing, notwithstanding that Dr. McIntyre and his lieutenants had evidently made all their arrangements to prevent a fair discussion. The speakers were Messrs. McIntyre, A. C. Macdonald, Thomas Kickham, John McLean, Archibald Lowrie and Senator Ferguson. During the delivery of Mr. Ferguson's speech he was frequently interrupted by two of Mr. McIntyre's lieutenants from the east. The effect of these interruptions was altogether different from what was expected, as they gave the Senator opportunities of pouring red hot shot into the policy of the grit party; and the meeting was so disgusted with the tactics of Dr. McIntyre's satellites, that they very courteously allowed the Senator an additional half hour. In Monticello, as in every other part of the noble county of Kings, the popular Conservative candidate, A. C. Macdonald, Esq., is gaining ground, and Dr. McIntyre is sure to be buried beneath an avalanche of ballots on the 27th of June next.
