Enthusiastic Crowd Sees Water Follies

An enthusiastic crowd of some 750 persons last night at the Exhibition Coliseum watched one of the most unusual shows ever to come to the city. The International Water Follies, which opened here last night on its first engagement in the province, features about a dozen aquatic beauties who esport around in a 75-foot portable pool and four champion divers who exhibit their skills in a 50-foot pool.

The Water Follies, however, is not just a water show. The two-hour production also contains comedy acts, musical entertainment, dance numbers and even a fashion show (of swimsuits).

A special hit with the audience was water comedian Eddie Rose, whose act involves diving skill and musical ability as well as humor.

Musical highlights were provided by trumpeter Dick Burgess and singers Martha Maxwell and Mal Thomas, the show's master of ceremonies.

Helping hold up the aquatic end of the show were "Aqua Belles", featuring Mary Dwight of St. Petersburg, Fla., who performed a number of colorful water ballet acts.

MONTAGUE — Hon. Henry Wedge, minister of welfare, was conducted on an inspection tour of the new Senior Citizen's homes at Montague by Douglas McGowan, M.L.A., G. Ronald Wright, town clerk for Montague, and Douglas MacLaren, welfare department representative.

The two buildings, with four units in each, are nearing completion and will be officially opened on or near Sept. 1. They will be occupied at that time.

Kinkora Wants 120 Blood Donors

Kinkora regional high school will be the locale for this year's afternoon Red Cross blood donor clinic which will take place next Tuesday, August 10, from 2 to 4 with a minimum objective of 120 donors.

Ralph MacCarville of Kinkora is again chairing this community endeavor which consistently meets with generous response. Last year, for example, an all-time high attendance of 161 chalked up a 134 per cent record to place the Kinkora area second in the provincial blood donor competition for the "Manning Trophy" which was won last year by Souris with a record attendance of 141.3 per cent.

Kinkora won the coveted "Manning Trophy" in 1958, and have just missed being the winners in several other years.

According to the provincial Red Cross blood donor chairman, F.A.S. Jones, there is every indication that the same effort and response can be expected from the residents of the Kinkora area when the annual Red Cross clinic is held at Kinkora regional high school Tuesday.

Consolidation Urged On Farm Credit Groups

OTTAWA (CP) — Consolidation of existing federal government farm credit administrations in a single new Crown agency is being proposed by the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, it was announced Wednesday.

The federation's board of directors, meeting in Winnipeg last week, proposed the single agency to provide a co-ordinated and improved farm credit service throughout Canada. The proposal will be submitted to the government.

In its announcement Wednesday, the federation said the services and personnel of the Farm Credit Corporation, the Veterans' Land Administration, and the Farm Improvement Loans Administration should be integrated.

It also proposed closer and more effective consultation between federal and provincial agencies in the field of farm credit, and said interest rates should be subsidized for low-income farmers undertaking credit service to provide through direct and indirect means a complete credit service for farmers, the federation said.

"It would greatly facilitate the co-ordination of long and intermediate term credit policies and programs, so that the majority of our farmers might expect to get their credit needs from one or two sources, instead of four or five or more as is too frequently the case at present."

He insists persons are deliberately discarding these animals. Lately the SPCA has found boxes containing young kittens. These kittens were thrown on the roadside to die.

Farmers are reporting stray dogs in abundance and it is felt these dogs are being turned loose by their former owners.

Constable Dennis made it plain that his association, The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, has the necessary equipment to humanely destroy these dogs and cats if the owners want them done away with. If it is a case of finding a home for these animals, the SPCA will do its utmost to accommodate.

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DR. MACKINNON REPORTS

Simple Gov't Methods Baffle Newer Nations

The complexity of problems arising in newly developed countries from operations which are considered normal and simple in countries with a long democratic background formed a fascinating backdrop for the Paris conference, Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College, said yesterday following his return to Canada.

Dr. MacKinnon left for Paris July 16 to attend the conference, held every three years, of the International Congress of Administrative Sciences, a branch of UNESCO. It was set up for the purpose of giving advice and direction to governments in new countries in relation to problems new to them.

Some of these arise from such ordinary operations as the establishing of power companies, universities or railways. Such matters as proper management, staff training, as well as obtaining qualified personnel, while routine in countries of long established tradition are completely strange to people of such far-off places as have been created in the depths of Africa.

Dr. MacKinnon said operations which are normal and routine to the average person here cause new governments all sorts of trouble. "After all how can you explain the operation of a good university to a people who have never even heard of education?"

Just such things as this, he said, were brought to the conference floor by many of the 200 delegates attending the conference. And it was to provide the answers that the congress was established.

The local educationist also noted the new countries' great need of instruction and assistance in the new techniques of budget preparation. He said this was particularly true of small places receiving international financial aid; the wise handling of the money became important, especially when it was to be used to establish public but not government, services such as power companies or railways.

In these matters there is a particularly rapid development all over the world and aid was badly needed in the field of management and personnel.

Another subject of tremendous importance to the new countries was the matter of public relations where they were faced with the problem of trying to get across to the public ideas on programs which they did not understand and how to 'carry' the public with them as plans developed.

Hearing these problems aired in open meeting and listening to the discussions on them and the exchange of ideas which followed provided the greatest value of such gatherings, Dr. MacKinnon said. Many of these problems arise from such a simple thing as the fact there is no assurance of a continuing government in many of these places because even that phase of what to us is normal life is strange to them.

He believed one of the more serious facets involved was in the endeavour to teach new governments how to exercise democratic controls over the various public services which are not government operated. And on this point always arose the question of where these governments were to obtain the technical efficiency they needed — from democratic countries or those of the communist world.
