Dr. Smith Buried In N.S. Town He Spent Boyhood

By DAL WARRINGTON/Canadian Press Staff Writer WINDSOR, N.S. (CP) — Ex-faiths Minister Sidney Smith was buried Friday in this Annapolis Valley town where he grew up and began his career as a lawyer. His coffin was lowered into a grave under a big maple tree in Maple Wood Cemetery, beside the graves of his father and mother.

A warm spring sun, the sound of running water, and the wind in the leafless trees formed a background as Rev. Donald Miller, minister of Trinity United Church, read the committal service. About 100 people stood around the grave. About 500 had crowded into the church for a 25-minute service that began at 3.30 p.m. AST.

DELIVERS EULOGY Rev. Dr. J. D. MacLeod, a college friend of Dr. Smith and now president of the United Church Maritime conference, delivered the eulogy. He described the external affairs minister as "a native son who has returned home." Although born on Port Hood Island in Cape Breton, Mr. Smith came to Windsor as a boy. He grew up on his parents' small farm at the edge of the town, about a half-mile beyond the cemetery.

His death in Ottawa last Tuesday at the age of 62 caused "not only great national sorrow but sorrow to many nations," Dr. MacLeod said. "He travelled far and climbed high. He carries with him the unflinching respect and good will of all who know him."

CABINET MEMBER Revenue Minister Nowlan was the only member of the federal cabinet to attend the funeral and burial services here. He accompanied Mr. Smith's family from Ottawa Thursday night in a transport department Viscount. The body was flown from Ottawa in an ROAF North Star.

Others present were Nova Scotia's Lieutenant-Governor E. C. Ploof, Premier Robert L. Stan-

field, Chief Justice J. L. Hilsley of Nova Scotia, President A. E. Kerr of Dalhousie University and Canon H. L. Puxley, president of the University of King's College, both in Halifax; President Watson Kirkconnell of Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S.; Mr. Justice Vincent MacDonald of the Nova Scotia Supreme Court and Professor George Wilson, dean of the Dalhousie Law School.

In a rear pew sat white-haired retired court judge H. W. Sangster of Windsor, now almost 90. In Judge Sangster's law office, Dr. Smith articulated 35 years ago, after his graduation from Dalhousie Law School. About 150 people crowded into a Sunday school room in the church basement to hear the service over a public address system.

OTHERS ATTENDING Also attending were Mayors Charles Vaughan of Halifax, Dr. K. K. Dimock of Windsor, Mrs. Gladys Porter of Kentville and Dr. R. S. Longley of Wolfville. Mrs. Smith and her three daughters, Mrs. Shelagh Rand Davenport of Bristol, England; Mrs. A. F. M. MacKinnon of Nobel, Ont., and Heather of Toronto, sat in a front pew at the right side of the church.

With them were Dr. Smith's brother, Frank, of Halifax and his sister, Mrs. Maude Morton of Three Mile Plains, near here. After the burial Mrs. Smith left to return to Ottawa, where she and her husband lived since he entered the federal cabinet 1 1/2 years ago.
