SUMMERSIDE — A motion was passed at the regular meeting of the Y's Men Club last night, giving financial assistance to the local Queen's Scouts Francis Kelly and John Sharp for their trip this summer to attend the International Jamboree at Valley Forge, U.S.

The two scouts from the Summerside troop will be among a contingent of five from P.E.I. chosen to attend this year's jamboree in July.

The meeting, chaired by Alex Campbell, president of the local club, was a business meeting, the only guest being Keith Piccard, a former club member.

The major part of the meeting was taken up by a discussion of the new international headquarters building for Y's dom which is being built as a memorial to the late Henry D. Grimes, one of the most outstanding figures in the international association of Y's Men's Clubs.

The new building will be constructed at Downers Grove, Illinois, and will be financed by Y's men and Y's Men's Clubs throughout the world, symbolizing the international aspect of Y's-dom.

The Summerside club pledged itself to a substantial subscription to this building fund, the money to be raised separately from individuals by the club from the funds used by the club in supporting local youth activities.

This was followed by a reminder that the people of Summerside will take place this coming Saturday afternoon. **Former Boss Of Ghetto Given Life**  
BOCHUM (Reuters) — The former Nazi SS "boss" of the Jewish ghetto at Tarnow, Poland, Hermann Blache, 63, was jailed by a West German court Thursday for life with hard labor for wartime murders.

A Bochum court found Blache guilty on 22 charges of murder and complicity in the killing of 4,000 Jews at the Tarnow ghetto.

Blache was accused of having shot more than 100 Jewish men, women and children and of having trampled several children to death.

He was said to have ordered his men, then 15, to practice shooting at people.

Blache denied the charges. He said he shot only one Jew, the other executions being carried out by Gestapo officials.

# St. Patrick's Girls Choir Praised By Adjudicator

Adjudicator Eric Lewis had high praise for St. Patrick's Junior Girls Choir yesterday for their singing of the Gregorian chant "Involuta".

He was so impressed, that he awarded the choir the highest mark to come thus far out of the Charlottetown end of the annual P.E.I. Music Festival.

In giving them the mark of 89, he said that if he remembered anything else about the Festival a Charlottetown, he would remember the beauty of the chant which the girls had sung "all most perfectly".

**Moves Into New Office**  
GEORGETOWN — The office of Bathurst Marine Ltd., which since operations began early last fall has been situated on the second floor of the post office building in Georgetown, was moved Thursday to the company's new office building on the shipyard site at the east end of Water Street.

The new office building will provide accommodations for the facilities and staff necessary for the operations of the company. The office will be utilized as the plant moves its operations from Bathurst, N.B.

On the plant site, steel workers are engaged in the final stages of closing in the roof of the big shed in which the draggers will be constructed. The walls will be insulated and large doors installed in the near future.

Work is also progressing on the building which will serve as a carpenter shop.

GEORGETOWN — The most important day of the year in the lives of lobster fishermen dawned bright and clear yesterday with winds in the light to medium range. About 100 lobster boats landed in gear to the west of the harbor.

Left Georgetown harbor, Lower Montserrat, Sturgeon, and Panmure Island for the nearby fishing grounds.

Most of the fishermen later in the day were able to put several loads of traps on their lines.

For the past two weeks the wharves in Georgetown have been filled to capacity with traps and all along the waterfront the activity has been at a fever pitch as boats were painted and gear made ready for the big day.

No ice is reported in the immediate area. It has been said by a reliable source that the starting price for lobsters will be even higher than last season and the figure of between 45 and 50 cents per pound is currently mentioned.
