Graduation Exercises At Summerside Air Station

The R. C. A. F. Navigation School at Summerside was the scene of an impressive graduation parade yesterday. Canadian cadets, as well as those from the Royal Air Force, received the coveted wings of the air navigator from Air Commodore F. S. Carpenter, A. F. C. O. D.
The parade, under the command of Flight Cadet Currie, was composed entirely of cadets and was witnessed by friends, relatives, and instructors of the graduates. Other interested onlookers were airmen from Canada, Belgium, England, France and Italy, all of whom are training here under Canada's part in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization training scheme.

The honor student of the graduating class was Pilot Officer Guy Templeman, of the Royal Air Force. Flying Officer P. G. Griffiths, the course director, called the graduating students to receive their wings from Air Commodore Carpenter. A father and son met in a brief but happy reunion for the graduation ceremony, when Flight Lt. J. J. (Johnny) Wybou, himself a veteran of the R. C. A. F. for the past 25 years, flew from his present station at Claresholm, Alberta, to be present at the graduation of his 19-year-old son, Pilot Officer (Ron) Wybou. Twenty minutes after the graduation ceremony the father had to leave by air on his return to Alberta.

The Wybou's are well known in the Summerside area, the father having served as chief technical officer at the Summerside station in 1948 and 1949, and during this time the son was a student at the Summerside High School.
This Air Navigation School will no longer produce entirely Canadian graduating classes. The program calls for the training of navigators to man the air forces of NATO countries.
From now on, each course will have representatives of foreign lands and although instruction will be in English.

The Canadian members of yesterday's class will be promoted to the rank of pilot officer, while the R. A. F. trainees, already provisionally pilot officers, receive their commissions outright.
The Air Commodore in his remarks to the graduates said they were to be congratulated on crossing the first hurdle in their air-force life.
However, they are just beginning to learn the job, he said, and in it there was much to learn.

Equipments With Skills

For the journey into the more barren North, a Douglas DC3 equipped with skis has been in service. Maritime Central was the first private company in Canada to equip a Douglas with this type of landing gear. Some Canadian military planes, however, had been previously using ski equipped Douglas.
When warmer weather arrives the journeys into the Far North will be carried out by the company's Canco flying boat. The Canco can land in remote lakes, or on land with equal ease.
By mid-summer the company expects to have thirty to fifty pilots employed, and the combined working force of Maritime Central Airways and Maritime Central Maintenance, with administrative staff will total about three hundred.

When Mayor Stewart discussed port expansion he referred to this large working force and added: "This is probably the largest group of people steadily employed the year around in the province, by private company. The value of this company to Charlottetown and the province cannot be rated too highly."
