SUPREME COURT.

THE CHIEF JUSTICE

THE CHIEF JUSTICE this morning gave judgment in the following suits tried in Summerside last June term and in which judgment was reserved:—

R. T. Holman vs Reuben Roblee—action on promissory note. Defence being that the note was signed "Reuben Roblee & Co." by one Thos Roblee acting under a power of attorney from Reuben Roblee. The court held defence good, and plaintiff was nonsuited.

J. E. Wyatt appeared for the defendant, Roblee.

W. A. Brennan vs. Pascal Hebert. Judgment for the plaintiff for \$73.70.

Eugene G. Craswall vs Collins Craswell. Judgment for plaintiff for \$107.33.
